Ambulances are used for transport. Firstly, the dirty patients are brought from the camp to a delousing station, where they are scrubbed and powdered with anti-lice powder, they are then put in a clean ambulance and taken to hospital. Shots were made CU of sign on wagon carrying patient to de-lousing station, insert here was of Miss Russell Smith driver of one of the clean ambulances entering the cab of her vehicle.
