Title: David Klipp Papers, 1945-1947.

Provenance: Photographer is unknown. The poem was written by Walter Dehmel and was presented to David Klipp in 1945. The letter from the War Crimes Group was sent to David Klipp by Captain H. Cleaver in 1947. David Klipp donated the collection to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in 1990.

Biographical/historical note: David Klipp was born on July 9, 1905, in Skudy, Lithuania. On January 17, 1940, David was forced out of his apartment and was brought to the ghetto in Lodz and from there, to Auschwitz. He was on the same transport as Chaim Rumkowski and Leon Rosenblat. After going to Auschwitz, he was sent to the Continental-Gummi-Werke, he was made to work on the upper floors where rubber was cooked. On November 30, 1944, he was sent to Ahlem, a subcamp of Neuengamme, to work in an old asphalt mine. Ahlem was evacuated on April 6, 1945. He came to the United States in 1950.

Scope and content note: The collection consists of photographs of commemoration ceremonies in Hannover, Germany, in September 1946; a poem in German; a letter, from the War Crimes Group to David Klipp, that lists the verdicts of the Hannover-Ahlem trial; and David Klipp's testimonies about two camps, Conti and Ahlem.
