Scope and content note: Contains a memoir entitled, "Holocaust Experiences," in English and Russian, papers stating that Semyon Menyuk was a member of partisan movements in the Ukraine, awards for outstanding military service, photographs of families, and photographs of an excavation site where 7,000 people were found.

1. 1 memoir entitled "Holocaust Experiences," n.d. In English and Russian.
2. Partisan identity card issued to Semyon Moissevitch Menyuk. It states that he was a member of the partisan and underground movement in Ukraine from May 1943 to May 1944. Issued by the Committee on Business of the former Partisans of Ukraine, 1973 September.
3. Award given to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk for outstanding participation with the partisans and for medals, 1946 May 28.
4. Certificate "Issued to Semyon Moiseevitch Menyuk. He indeed belonged to partisan detachment compound 'Dyada Petta' from May 1943 to April 24, 1944.

At the present time he is being sent to reserve regiment of the Acting Army.”
1944 April 24.

5. Military certificate issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk, from the Director of Hospital 4107. It states that he was injured from shrapnel in the tendon of his left leg, 1945 Jan. 15.
6. Certificate issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk by the Ministry of Social Security of the Ukrainian Republic. It states his disability, 1971 Nov. 25.
7. Pension certificate issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk from the Ministry of Social Security of the Ukrainian Republic. It states the reason for the renewal of his pension and the amount, 1967 Jan. 13.
8. Certificate of injury issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk from a military hospital. It states that he was seriously wounded on July 11, 1944 from shrapnel in the tendon of the left leg, 1945 Jan. 15.
9. Certificate issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk from the Kiev Regional Council of Workers' Deputies, n.d. It states that he has free use of all public transportation.
10. Certificate issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk from the Komarovo's village Soviet of delegate workers. It states that he lived in the village Komarovo, his family was killed by German Fascists in 1942, and that the house and property were burned, 1975 Aug. 16.
11. Award for medal issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk for partisans in the Russian army, 1946 Feb. 22.
12. Award for medal issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk for military service in the Russian Army, 1967 Feb. 12.
13. Award for medal issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk for military service in the Russian army, 1974 Mar. 19.
14. Award for medal issued to Semyon Moisseevitch Menyuk for being a good soldier, n.d. (25 years after war).
15. 1 photoprint: b&w. Photograph of Abel, Rivka, Shimon, and Dwoira Perlmutter (mother's sister, her husband, their daughter and son, and another relative's child), ca. 1937.
16. 1 photoprint: b&w. Photograph of Moyshe and Mushka, Meniuk and Freda Perlmutter (mother, father, and cousin), ca. 1925-1927.

17. 2 photoprints: b&w. Photographs of the site where Jewish people from Kolky Ghetto were killed. The ground was dug and it was discovered that 7000 people were buried there, 1947.
