Biographical note

Josef Nassy (1904–1976) was born in Paramaribo, Suriname (Dutch Guiana) to Adolf Nassy and Elisabeth de Maesschalk. Adolf Nassy was a businessman whose Jewish family had fled Spain during the Inquisition. He joined his father in New York in 1919, studied electrical engineering, and worked in London and Paris installing movie sound systems before studying painting at the Academie des Beaux Arts in Brussels. He was arrested in German-occupied Belgium in April 1942 as an enemy national because he still held an American passport. He was held for seven months at the Beverloo transit camp in Leopoldsburg, Belgium and then transferred to the Laufen internment camp and its subcamp at Tittmoning (Ilag VII) until it was liberated by the Third United States Army in May 1945. Laufen and Tittmoning were governed by rules of the Geneva Conventions, and while imprisoned, Nassy was supplied with art materials by the International YMCA. He created more than 200 paintings and drawings chronicling the people and the appearance of the camp, with works featuring the barbed wire, watch towers, and prison bars.

Scope and content of collection

The Josef Nassy papers include a letter thanking Nassy for art classes he taught at the Laufen internment camp, a travel permit allowing Nassy to cross the border into Austria and return, a program for Nassy's October 1946 exhibition of internment camp artwork in Brussels, and Nassy's 1953 employment card indicating his status as a foreign artist working in Belgium. The employment card falsely claims that Nassy was born in San Francisco in 1899.
