- .4 **Photograph;** studio portrait of Klara and Erwin Kirszenbaum, children of Oskar Kirszenbaum, holding traditional cones marking first day of school; dated: September 1929; location: Berlin, Germany
- .5 **Photograph;** studio portrait of Ida and Abraham Romek Szrajber, Lola's sister and brother-in-law; Romek Szrajber died in 1936, Ida and her three children were murdered in Belzec; dated: April 26, 1927; location: Domacyny, Poland
- .6 **Photograph;** studio portrait of (from left) Klara, Erwin and Charlotte Kirszenbaum, children of Oskar Kirszenbaum, Lola's brother; dated: October 11, 1923; location: Berlin, Germany
