- 2. Photographic postcard of five Hassidic Jewish men sitting on a bench, Zamość, Poland, circa 1930. Urys Bajtel sits first from left.
- 3. Photographic postcard of four young Jewish girls sitting at a table, Zamość, Poland, circa 1925. Sara Bajtel is seated second from the right.
- 4. Postcard of the Zamość market place in Poland with "Armenian" houses, undated.
- 5. Photograph, studio portrait of Sara Bajtel, Zamość, Poland, circa 1925. Inscribed: "To my dear brother Itzhak from Sara."
- 6. Photograph, studio portrait of Sara Bajtel and Itzhak Bajtel, Zamość, Poland, circa 1925. Likely taken before Itzhak Bajtel's journey to Palestine.
- 7. Photograph, studio portrait of Rebeka Regina Hertzberg and her brother, Chaim-Wolf Hertzberg, Zamość, Poland, circa 1918. They are the children of Rajzla Bajtel and Aron Hertzberg. Chaim Wolf was executed in 1936 in the USSR. Regina and her parents survived the war in the USSR and Regina lived in Warsaw, Poland.
- 8. Photograph, studio portrait of Saul Lederkramer (right) and Moniek Lederkramer, Zamość, Poland, circa 1924. They are the children of Mindla Bajtel Lederkramer. All perished in the Holocaust.
- 9. Photograph, studio portrait of Moshe Mojżesz Bajtel, Zamość, Poland, circa 1920. Moshe Bajtel married Rózia Tajchman and they had three sons: Chastek Tachman, Dov Tajchman, and Urys Tajchman.

- 10. Photograph, portrait of Moshe Mojżesz, Zamość, Poland, circa 1925. Moshe Mojżesz is the youngest son of Etla Bajtel, he perished in 1942.
- 11. Photograph, studio portrait of baby Rebeka Regina Hertzberg, daughter of Rajzla Bajtel and Aron Hertzberg, Zamość, Poland, circa 1915.
- 12. Photograph, portrait of Chaja Gibersztajn and her sons, Mojżesz Gibersztajn and Juliusz Gibersztajn, Warsaw, Poland. Chaja and Chaim Gibersztajn, along with their son Juliusz Gibersztajn, perished in the Warsaw ghetto. Mojżesz Gibersztajn survived the war in Kazakhstan, USSR.
- 13. Photograph of Blima Orensztajn and her husband, Heskiel Orensztajn, walking with their friends, Poland, June 22, 1935. Blima Oresztajn is the daughter of Etla Bajtel.
- 14. Photograph, portrait of Izak Itzhak Bajtel, Poland, circa 1925. Izak Bajtel was born in 1895 and immigrated to Palestine in the 1920s.
- 15. Photographic postcard, group portrait of young Jewish workers desiccating the swamps by planting Eucalyptus trees, Tiberias, Palestine, December 1921. Itzhak Bajtel is laying on the ground, second from the left. Inscription in Hebrew: "Group of workers planting Eucalyptuses in Valley of Yizrael, Tamuz TARP"A; to my sisters: Gula and Fajga as a memento from Itzhak Bajtel." 2 copies.
- 16. Photographic postcard, group portrait of young Jewish workers building an unidentified structure, Palestine, circa 1921. Itzhak Bajtel stands in the middle.
- 17. Photographic postcard, group portrait of Itzhak Bajtel sitting first on the right with Yosef and Chava Fuks on left; and Zvi Gebett standing on right, Rosh Pina, Palestine, circa 1921.
