### **Hirszfeld and Grosfeld Families Photograph Collection Inventory**

1. Photograph, studio portrait of Rywka Bela Hirszfeld, maternal grandmother of Tamar Grosfeld Klein, Dąbrowa Górnicza, Poland, circa 1932. Rywka Bela Hirszfeld perished in the Holocaust.
2. Group photograph students in a Jewish gymnasium, Dąbrowa Górnicza, Poland, circa 1925. Standing second from right is Gicie Grosfeld, (Tamar Grosfeld Klein's paternal aunt); Lilka Hirszfeld, (Tamar Grosfeld Klein's maternal aunt, who immigrated to Palestine before the war). Seated from right are: Gucia Hirszfeld, (Tamar G. Klein's maternal aunt and adoptive mother); Cyla Bajtner (mother of Dan Tichon, speaker of the Knesset), and Sara Unger-Jakobson.
3. Photograph, studio portrait of the Fajfkopf family, Dąbrowa Górnicza, Poland, circa 1935. Seated is Sara Laja Hirszfeld Fajfkopf (Tamar G. Klein's maternal aunt); her husband, Nachum Fajfkopf stands behind her and their children: Szymon Fajfkopf and Fela Fajfkopf stand next to their father.
