**Biographical/Historical Note:** Hedy Epstein (b. Hedwig Wachenheimer, 1924, Freiburg, Germany) fled to England on a Kindertransport in May 1939 where she remained for the duration of World War II. She returned to Germany after the war worked as a research analyst for the Office of Chief of Counsel during the International Military Tribunal and subsequent trials in Nuremberg.
