Scope and content of collection

The collection contains a photocopy of Goring's directive establishing the headquarters in German-occupied territories for the confiscation of valuables form the Jewish and masonic organizations, Rosenberg's orders stablishing the task Force, memoranda and correspondence of the ERR special headquarters in the Ukraine and Croatia. Most of material pertains to Yugoslavia and ERR efforts to collect and remove to Germany cultural material, and to conduct propaganda against Jews and Freemasons. Included are lists of confiscated Jewish property; protocols of interrogations of Jews and Freemasons regarding their property; a list of Jewish writers and a list of German-Jewish writers; a list of Jews still resident in Dubrovnik; a list of books confiscated by ERR in Riga, Latvia; and summary reports of ERR actions in Greece in 1941, with an estimate of the number of Jews in various Greek cities and towns; and lists of Jewish organizations.

Orders of the Field Commandant's office in Zagreb. April 1941 - November 1942. 228 pp. Folder begins at image 6

Directives from German military headquarters in Agram (Zagreb), Croatia: deals with variety of subjects of an administrative nature as well as partisan activities, escape of POWs, reports of enemy planes in area, etc. Facsimile of Military Supreme Command publication "Information for the Troops." Headquarters directives (Zagreb) with do and don'ts for troop behavior, searches for escaped criminals, cooperation with Croatian guards; announcement of Heydrich assassination and search for perpetrators with description of two of the assassins, and reward of one million DM if captured (May 30, 1942). Other directive items deal with troop hygiene, venereal disease, setting up of non-com and privates bordellos; issue of extraterritoriality of German military personnel on Croatian sovereign territory. 1941-1942.

Copies of Hitler's orders about the use of personal cars. Photocopy of letter written by Rosenberg devoted to tasks of his staff in Western areas. Circular letters from the Field Commandant's Office in Zagreb to commanders and chiefs of German establishments in Zagreb about increasing vigilance. List of orthodox societies in Zagreb. 27 May 1941 - 7 October 1942. 39 pp. Folder begins at image 321

Material from files of Rosenberg Office for Occupied Territories in Zagreb, with a number of administrative matters and warnings against foreign intelligence activities. Secret directive from field command headquarters about struggle against Jews, Freemasons, and their ilk, including request from Croatian state to Rosenberg office for help in this struggle and promise of Croatia's cooperation with Rosenberg outfit. Rosenberg, in the role of Hitler's guardian of intellectual and political education of Party,

sets up local staff for the collection of all suspect printed material, libraries, etc. in the Balkans (February 1941). 1941-1942.

Göring circular letter regarding establishment of staffs in all occupied territories for the purposes of fighting Jews and Masons, protecting cultural property, and removing it to Germany. 1 May 1941. 4 pp. Folder begins at image 365

Croatian foreign minister authorizes Rosenberg special detachment, in cooperation with Croatian authorities, to confiscate material from Jews and Freemasons. Difficult to read memo dealing with Goering emphasis on importance to combat Jews, Freemasons, and their like during wartime (May 1, 1941). 1941.

Directives and orders to foreign departments of the staff. Monthly reviews and notes about Rosenberg's staff in Croatia. Mission: of Jews and Masons and others as instigators of the present war. November 1941 - November 1942. 139 pp. Folder begins at image 376

Directives from Rosenberg Special Detachment for Occupied Territories, headquartered in Berlin: personnel matters and other administrative items such as rules governing staff travel, etc. From Army Supreme Command, on deployment of Special Command of Reichsleader Rosenberg's Detachment for Occupied Territories. Announcement of Führer appointment of Rosenberg as his special representative to combat Jews and Freemasons, with explanation of causes of war, and detailed tasks assigned to Rosenberg. Report about anti-Jewish raid in Varazdin (Croatia): Jews deported after start of war have now returned, often protected by Croats. Now local authorities have arrested these Jews and are holding them in local jails. Report about Croatian concerns that Hungary will take over part of Croatia, and if there is no decisive German victory in war, that Italians will use Serbs against Croats. Report by Rosenberg special staff on mood in Croatia. Report about Jews in Sarajevo (around 9-10,000), 3-4,000 of whom left mostly for Italian-controlled areas where they are being protected by Italian occupation troops. In Dalmatia, Croats are moving against Jews, while those went to Italian-controlled areas are under Italian protection. Report of situation of Jews in Banja Luka. Reports on Croatian Islamic Cooperation, including one that the state's 700,000 Moslems tend to be friendly toward Germany. Other reports from travels through Croatia by Rosenberg delegate in region, including fate of Jews located between Mur and Drawe rivers, mostly under Hungarian control. There Jews hold important positions and are doing well, whereas Croats are being persecuted and exiled. 1941-1942.

Reports from Rosenberg's staff about his activities. Notes of the staff in Croatia about staff structure and activities in Yugoslavia. Correspondence with German Scientific Institute in Belgrade regarding library of Dr. Vladimir Korovic. The Jewish question. 1939 - 1942. 114 pp. Folder begins at image 541

More field reports from Rosenberg special detachment in Zagreb, including inventories of various Croatian libraries. Croatian interior ministry representatives report to Rosenberg staff their intention to create a race-political office in the university dealing with such questions as the relationship of race to national wellbeing. Rosenberg office provides books and other material to support this effort. Material for Rosenberg special

detachment in Yugoslavia concerning presence of Jews and Freemasons, with lists of regional and local Jewish organizational for some cities number of Jewish inhabitants is given (10,000 in Zagreb; 15,000 in Belgrade). Rosenberg office preparation for action in southeast Europe, with tasks, etc. 1939-1942.

9 Activities of Einsatzstab Rosenberg in Greece, a "conclusive" report [sic]. 15 November 1941. 83 pp. Folder begins at image 696

Final report on activities of Rosenberg special detachment in Greece, including tasks and staff. Section of number of Jews in Greece mentions 55,000 in Saloniki; 2,500 in Athens; and talks about role of Jews in country and cites Jewish organizations and emigration. List of officials of Greek Freemasons, with special list of Jewish Freemasons and their occupations. Report also includes list of synagogue and Jewish communities, Jewish clubs and other organizations, schools, and banks. Report has a section on searches and interrogation of non-official Jews and resulting arrests. 1941.

Notes on cultural property confiscated in Croatia (including Jewish property). List of persons searched. Protocols of searches. Persons accused of anti-Nazi activities in Croatia. June - July 1941. 124 pp. Folder begins at image 785

Rosenberg office activities in Dubrovnik, with report on visit to Jewish community and its possession of valuable historical publications. Report on activities of Rosenberg detachment in Ragusa (Rijeka) and Sarajevo, including comments on local Jewish presence and problems; lists of persons whose homes and libraries were put under lock and key. Listing of Jews temporarily and permanently present in Dubrovnik. List of persons who had previously and still are now working against a Free Croatia, and who also are enemies of the German Reich (Dubrovnik). List of emigrants recently arrived in Dubrovnik, including two U.S. citizens. Report about persons interrogated on suspicion of illegal activities, and actions taken on order of the SD. 1941.
