Scope and Content: This collection contains reproductions of 111 drawings and other work created by Boris Taslitzky in Buchenwald at great risk, and a catalogue of a 1942 Paris exhibition entitled "Bolshevism against Europe."

Biographical note: Boris Taslitzky was born in Paris in 1911. His parents were Russian refugees and his father died in 1915 during WW I. His mother was rounded-up on July 17, 1942, during the "Rafle de Vél d'hiv" and died during deportation to Auschwitz. Taslitzky was sent to Buchenwald as a Communist resistance fighter, not as a Jew. He was a frequent visitor to the Musée de la Résistance à Champigny and a conservator there. He died in 2005.
