Title: Mogilev Oblast Archive records, 1941-1945

Extent: 6 microfilm reels

Provenance: The records were created by the Mogilev City Administration, oblast government offices in Bobruysk, and German occupation agencies during World War II. The records were captured by the Red Army and later deposited in the Mogilev Oblast Archive. The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum Archives microfilmed selected files from the Mogilev Oblast Archives during the fall of 1991.

Historical Note: The city of Mogilev was in German hands from 27 July 1941 to 28 June 1944. Throughout this time, it was under military jurisdiction. The Germanized name of the indigenous mayor was Johann Felicin. The archival collections include also considerable materials of the city of Bobruisk, which was under military rule as well. The Mayor of Bobruisk was Adam J. Stankevich, who is not to be confused with the mayor of Borisov, Stanislav Stankevich.

Scope and Content: These files relate to the activities of various Mogilev city administration offices and German occupation agencies in the Mogilev area during World War II. Included is information about criminal proceedings, the persecution of Soviet Jews, the confiscation of Jewish property, reprisals against Jewish and partisan resistance, regulations for mixed marriages, the Mogilev ghetto, the transit of refugees, Einsatzkommando activities, forced labor,

census statistics, and partisan clashes with police forces.

The total of Jewish victims enumerated in these reports is more than five thousand. The major massacre, with 3,726 victims, occurred on 19 October 1941.
