Scope and content: This collection contains Häftlingspersonalbögen and other camp records from Auschwitz for the years 1942 to 1945.

Inventory:

Reel 1

Reel consists of two parts. Legibility varies, and much of the second part is extremely difficult to read. All of the material was held by the ITS in Arolsen, copied for Yad Vashem, and then copied for the USHMM.

The first part is a typed list, compiled after the war (probably prepared for war crimes trials), of 5,270 names of persons who arrived in Auschwitz between July 25, 1942 and October 28, 1944, and June 8, 1943-June 26,1943. Prisoner numbers run between 52,430 and 116,999. However this list obviously includes less than 10% of these persons. The information provided includes: prisoner's name, number, date of birth, nationality (or sometimes the name of a city) and when that person arrived in Auschwitz. It does not state that person's fate. Legibility is poor.

This is followed by handwritten daily reports (Veränderungsmeldungen) for January 19, 1942 through August 18, 1942. Most of the material consists of daily reports of deaths, but there are also some lists of transfers (überstellungen) to unspecified places, arrivals, and a few releases (entlassenen). In some cases only a prisoner number is given. However, most lists give a name, category of prisoner (e.g. Dutch Jew, or simply, Pole), prisoner number, date of birth and date of death, transfer or release. The material includes Jews and non-Jews: the largest number of Jews from France and Slovakia and the largest number of non-Jews from Poland. Some of the names do not appear in the published Auschwitz death books for Jews and non-Jews, nor are these death dates recorded in Klarsfeld's French deportation book.

Reel 2

As in the previous reel, portions of this reel contain daily reports that, although difficult to read, all appear to date to August 1942.

The bulk of the material on this reel, however, consists of lists of transports to or from Auschwitz. Listed below are the transports for which origin or destination was noted. Most prisoners are identified only by name, prisoner number and date of birth, but occasionally place of birth and/or profession is included. Legibility of material is highly variable.

The next section on the reel consists of a list of transports. The lists are mostly illegible but each list has been retyped (probably by ITS) and dates of death for most persons have been added. Lists total over 10,000 names, about two thirds with death dates.

The reel continues with Personalbogen, beginning with women with names from Ajzner to Zylbermann. Then men from Abastado to Bartoszewski. (see below)

Reels 4-8:

These reels contain Auschwitz Personalbogen (forms giving information on individual forced laborers), organized alphabetically by last name. Legibility of material varies

from excellent to virtually illegible. Prisoners include Jews and non-Jews, of virtually every European nationality. Given information includes name, date, place of birth and last residence, profession, religion, physical description, information on family members, etc. The majority of names of Jewish laborers are recorded in another collection of Personalbogen held by the Holocaust Museum. The names of non-Jewish laborers are elsewhere unrecorded in the museum's collection, and appear only on these reels.

Reel 4:

Aforementioned Personalbogen, beginning with Bartoszewski and ending with Goldstein.

Reel 5:

Continuation of list, from Golstein to Kocznur.

Reel 6:

Continuation of list, from Koen to Mystkowski.

Reel 7:

Continuation of list, from Neter to Strus.

Reel 8:

Continuation of list, from Strus to Zyser.

The rest of the reel contains a list, organized alphabetically by name, of prisoners' personal possessions (Effektenverzeichnisse). Almost all persons appear to be non-Jewish. Given information includes name and prisoner number. The portion of the list on this reel begins with Abhosov and ends at Koroliszyn.

Reel 9:

Continuation of list, from Koroliszyn to Zyromski.

Property lists begin after the list of personal possessions ends. Prisoners' names are not included, but prisoner number is given.

This is followed by 17 individual files (Einzelmeldungen) relating to work detail changes, suicides, etc.

The reel also contains material relating to Gölleschau, a subcamp of Auschwitz. The material begins with a list of transports of male prisoners to Gölleschau between April 1943 and December 1944. Legibility is variable. Following the transport list is a Kommando Buch, apparently a list of prisoners. This includes names, dates of birth, and sometimes dates of death. The typed list consists of 2,348 names – mostly Dutch.

The material then continues on to detail prisoner interrogations (Häftlingsvernehmungen). The material is largely illegible. Following is a list of 19 German persons with multiple convictions (Berufsverbrecher), followed by a list of prisoner punishments (Strafmeldungen). This material is also mostly illegible.

At the end of the reel is the beginning of large collection, carried over to Reel 10, of hospital records. 5,470 names are included, but the records are mostly illegible.

Reel 10:

Continuation of hospital records detailing admission and releases, medicines used/treatments administered, etc. The records are mostly illegible.

At the end of the reel is a list, compiled after the war, of survivors who had been subject to medical experiments.

Reel 11:

Duty assignments (Verpflichtungs Erklärungen) for prisoners (mostly illegible). Verschiedene Berichte und Raporte (scattered individual files). Postwar correspondence with UNRRA and other organizations attempting to identify individuals. October-December 1942 lists of prisoners at unidentified sub camp, hundreds of names. List of 78 Jews deported from Giessen to Auschwitz. List of 26 Jews deported to Auschwitz from Württemberg. 3 lists of Norwegian Jews deported to Auschwitz.

The end of the reel contains death certificates for Jews and non-Jews—mostly illegible. Most identical with Auschwitz death books but certificates provide additional information on the individual and his/her family.

Reel 12:

Continuation of death certificates.

Reel 13:

Continuation of death certificates.

Following the death certificates are the Polish Red Cross records, specifically information cards on persons who died in Auschwitz between February and March 1945 (i.e., after liberation). Material is organized alphabetically by family name and usually gives name, nationality, year of birth (sometimes also place of birth) and date of death. A list of deaths on January 2, 1944 is also included. The information is then broken down by nationality: French, Dutch, Belgian and Polish. Legibility of the material is poor.

The reel ends with lists of prisoners from the crematorium. The prisoners are recorded by number—no names are given.

Reel 14:

The reel begins with a continuation of the crematorium lists.

This reel includes lists (which also appear in the French Government's publication Liste Officialle No 3), which include information on the 7 transports from Drancy to Auschwitz between March and August 1942. Added to these lists, however, are the dates of death for these persons.

Also on this reel are lists of people who died in the Auschwitz hospital, as well as brief lists from Majdanek, Bergen-Belsen, Sachsenhausen, Natzweiler and Ellrich.

There is a list of people executed at Auschwitz between November 1941 and March 1943. Following this list is a list of the deceased, organized by nationality: Belgian, Czech, French, German and Yugoslav. These lists appear to have been prepared after the war on the basis of the death certificates noted above.

Also included on this reel:

- Short list of dead in Natzweiler.
- List of persons who died in Auschwitz, by name but with no other identifying information.
- 1942-1943 Red Cross correspondences regarding prisoners.

Lists of persons, both Jews and non-Jews "found" (i.e., survivors) in the Auschwitz hospital on March 5, 1945. Lists are organized by nationality. The category termed "mixed nationalities," may include persons counted under other nationalities.

At the end of the reel is a large collection of Auschwitz prisoner photographs. No names are given, but prisoner numbers are recorded.

Reel 15:

The reel begins with a continuation of prisoner photographs. This is followed by a finding aid for the photographs, linking prisoner numbers (but not names) to photos, accompanied by category of prisoner (e.g. Pole or Hungarian Jews).

Charts with prisoner numbers (150,000 to 199,000) giving their "destination". By about half the numbers there appears "üb", probably überstellt (transferred), but not to where, or "int"—not clear what that means.

The reels end with the International Red Cross guide to prisoner numbers.
