00:01:11,090 --> 00:01:16,160 This came about the time when the order came up,

8 00:01:16,160 --> 00:01:20,090 and all throughout Europe it was I think August something.

9 00:01:20,090 --> 00:01:26,360 Heinrich came out with the villa,

10 00:01:26,360 --> 00:01:29,030 when he they got together all the Nazis

11 00:01:29,030 --> 00:01:33,080 and decided they're going to exterminate all the Jews.

12 00:01:33,080 --> 00:01:36,322 And Heinrich was the mastermind of all this

13

00:01:36,322 --> 00:01:37,030

Heinrich Himmler?

14

00:01:37,030 --> 00:01:38,578 Heinrich, Heinrich.

15

00:01:38,578 --> 00:01:39,078

Heydrich?

00:01:39,078 --> 00:01:39,578

Heydrich?

Is it Heydrich?

00:01:40,968 --> 00:01:41,510

I don't know.

Maybe I'm pronouncing it wrong.

It doesn't matter.

I know how to write

Anyhow, the order came

out throughout Europe

23

that all the Jews have to be exterminated.

24 00:01:51,050 --> 00:01:55,640

What they did ghetto, Berezne

was a bigger place than

25 00:01:55,640 --> 00:01:57,050 Malyns'k.

26 00:01:57,050 --> 00:02:00,290 They already had maybe about 3,000 Jews or something.

27 00:02:00,290 --> 00:02:03,230 They were already all put together sort of

28 00:02:03,230 --> 00:02:07,450 in like a ghetto.

29 00:02:07,450 --> 00:02:10,030 So they brought us from Malyns'k--

30 00:02:10,030 --> 00:02:14,290 in comparison, we were a small group--

31 00:02:14,290 --> 00:02:15,650 into the Berezne Ghetto.

32 00:02:15,650 --> 00:02:17,500 Do you remember that day?

33 00:02:17,500 --> 00:02:19,330 I remember one thing.

34 00:02:19,330 --> 00:02:26,890 Yes, they had horses pulling buggies,

35 00:02:26,890 --> 00:02:28,885 so the people who couldn't walk-- it

36 00:02:28,885 --> 00:02:31,000 was about 20 kilometers or something.

37 00:02:31,000 --> 00:02:33,940 And I think I was sitting there right in one of those too,

38 00:02:33,940 --> 00:02:38,650 where people could sit on it, and the man would walk next it.

39 00:02:38,650 --> 00:02:43,780 And there were horses pulling the buggies and the carriages.

40 00:02:43,780 --> 00:02:47,680 And we got to Berezne.

41 00:02:47,680 --> 00:02:49,510 What was it like for you?

42 00:02:49,510 --> 00:02:50,800 Was it frightening?

43 00:02:50,800 --> 00:02:52,930 Were people nervous?

44 00:02:52,930 --> 00:02:53,948 Were people upset?

45 00:02:53,948 --> 00:02:54,490 Very nervous.

46 00:02:54,490 --> 00:02:55,900 The people were apprehensive.

47 00:02:55,900 --> 00:02:59,770 The people were afraid, leaving your own environment,

48 00:02:59,770 --> 00:03:00,640 no matter how bad. 49

00:03:00,640 --> 00:03:05,590 But your family, you have people who came to see, gentle people.

50 00:03:05,590 --> 00:03:07,420 When they're grouped together we knew

51 00:03:07,420 --> 00:03:11,020 it's a bad sign, based on the rumors

52 00:03:11,020 --> 00:03:14,890 were heard from other people that this is no good.

53 00:03:14,890 --> 00:03:17,200 Whenever they bring all the Jews together,

54 00:03:17,200 --> 00:03:20,110 that something is going to happen.

55 00:03:20,110 --> 00:03:22,000 So they brought our whole family,

56 00:03:22,000 --> 00:03:27,130 everybody who lives they bring to Berezne, and they had--

57 00:03:27,130 --> 00:03:30,610 maybe just they were packed two families

58 00:03:30,610 --> 00:03:32,260 in one room or something.

59 00:03:32,260 --> 00:03:36,490 But they put this all together in one area. 60 00:03:36,490 --> 00:03:39,220 And they delineated the area, which

61 00:03:39,220 --> 00:03:43,930 was going to be Berezne Ghetto.

62 00:03:43,930 --> 00:03:48,160 My father and my uncle and some other men

63 00:03:48,160 --> 00:03:51,100 were sent to work outside of the ghetto

64 00:03:51,100 --> 00:03:55,210 in a place called Polany, because they could work.

65 00:03:55,210 --> 00:03:56,590 There was a farm there.

66 00:03:56,590 --> 00:04:01,750 But also they were doing something with trees, whatever.

67 00:04:01,750 --> 00:04:04,150 They were working outside of the ghetto.

68 00:04:04,150 --> 00:04:08,170 And I begged, can I go and be with my father,

69 00:04:08,170 --> 00:04:10,480 and I will help on the farm.

70 00:04:10,480 --> 00:04:15,650 I feel more secure with my father than be with the women

71 00:04:15,650 --> 00:04:18,370 hysterical and yelling and this and that.

72 00:04:18,370 --> 00:04:21,279 And there was more freedom, because you were out

73 00:04:21,279 --> 00:04:22,240 in the open.

74 00:04:22,240 --> 00:04:24,110 So they let me go.

75 00:04:24,110 --> 00:04:28,270 And I stayed with my father on that big farm.

76 00:04:28,270 --> 00:04:33,370 And I supposedly worked in the field.

77 00:04:33,370 --> 00:04:36,490 But my father was there and my uncle.

78 00:04:36,490 --> 00:04:42,290 And shortly after, we heard the rumor,

79 00:04:42,290 --> 00:04:47,780 somebody came and told my father that there

80 00:04:47,780 --> 00:04:50,840 is an order came out in Berezne Ghetto

81 00:04:50,840 --> 00:04:56,960 that all the Jews must be gathered in the ghetto,

82 00:04:56,960 --> 00:05:03,470 must stay, and that also they saw that a lot of police

83 00:05:03,470 --> 00:05:08,270 was coming to Berezne and also the--

84 00:05:08,270 --> 00:05:11,120 I don't know how the German word is-- the troops ,

85 00:05:11,120 --> 00:05:12,680 German troops do.

86 00:05:12,680 --> 00:05:16,070 So they were closing up the ghetto,

87 00:05:16,070 --> 00:05:20,420 wouldn't let people out, so we knew that things are bad.

88 00:05:20,420 --> 00:05:25,260 My mother was still left there, my aunt uncle in here.

89 00:05:25,260 --> 00:05:27,830 And so we never went back to Berezne regardless

90 00:05:27,830 --> 00:05:29,300 they said you all have to.

91 00:05:29,300 --> 00:05:30,440 We just stayed.

92 00:05:30,440 --> 00:05:34,100 We were fortunate to be near a forest that

93 00:05:34,100 --> 00:05:36,440 would save a lot of Jews from our area, 94

00:05:36,440 --> 00:05:38,880 that we were in the forest.

95 00:05:38,880 --> 00:05:42,800 We were not stuck in a ghetto like in the big cities

96 00:05:42,800 --> 00:05:43,910 or something.

97 00:05:43,910 --> 00:05:45,980 We could only sneak into the forest.

98 00:05:45,980 --> 00:05:48,740 So we never went back to Berezne.

99 00:05:48,740 --> 00:05:50,660 And the Germans didn't come there?

100 00:05:50,660 --> 00:05:52,070 They didn't come to get us.

101 00:05:52,070 --> 00:05:53,270 There was just a few of us.

102 00:05:53,270 --> 00:05:57,410 They were too busy rounding up people in Berezne.

103 00:05:57,410 --> 00:06:00,710 How my mother got out of there is a story of it itself.

104 00:06:00,710 --> 00:06:03,860 I had a cousin, a year older than me,

105 00:06:03,860 --> 00:06:06,530 and he was there in

Berezne, Benjamin,

106 00:06:06,530 --> 00:06:08,840 and he was very shrewd.

107 00:06:08,840 --> 00:06:12,110 He would go up and down the street and see what's going on.

108 00:06:12,110 --> 00:06:13,700 He came back to the house, and he

109 00:06:13,700 --> 00:06:18,860 says to his mother, and my mother, and to his sister,

110 00:06:18,860 --> 00:06:21,630 we're getting out of here.

111 00:06:21,630 --> 00:06:24,330 And he could see that something's happening.

112 00:06:24,330 --> 00:06:26,790 You could see the preparations.

113 00:06:26,790 --> 00:06:29,060 So how do you get out of the ghettos of Jews?

114 00:06:29,060 --> 00:06:31,616 So my mother and and my aunt, they

115 00:06:31,616 --> 00:06:33,140 put a kerchief on their heads.

116 00:06:33,140 --> 00:06:35,180 They looked like peasant women.

117 00:06:35,180 --> 00:06:40,200

And they had on the shoulder to carry the thing that you dig

118

00:06:40,200 --> 00:06:43,250 the ground hose or something.

119

00:06:43,250 --> 00:06:48,442 And they all looked like they were Ukrainian

120

00:06:48,442 --> 00:06:49,400 or the native peasants.

121

00:06:49,400 --> 00:06:52,070

122

00:06:52,070 --> 00:06:53,480 And they started leaving.

123

00:06:53,480 --> 00:06:55,910 Nobody suspected them as being Jews,

124

00:06:55,910 --> 00:07:00,590 because they looked like they blended in with the others.

125

00:07:00,590 --> 00:07:04,640

126

00:07:04,640 --> 00:07:06,500 And they ran in the forest.

127

00:07:06,500 --> 00:07:10,760 It didn't matter who, or what, just be in the forest,

128

00:07:10,760 --> 00:07:13,580 because they knew that in the forest, at least

129

00:07:13,580 --> 00:07:15,800

they were safer.

130 00:07:15,800 --> 00:07:18,230 We didn't know if my father didn't

131

00:07:18,230 --> 00:07:21,770 know a thing that my mother ran away from the ghetto

132 00:07:21,770 --> 00:07:23,090 and all us--.

133

00:07:23,090 --> 00:07:24,990 We went to right away in the forest too.

134

00:07:24,990 --> 00:07:28,280 We stayed alone, my uncle, my father, and me.

135 00:07:28,280 --> 00:07:30,320 And we thought that they were all killed.

136 00:07:30,320 --> 00:07:34,610 We knew that they were killing people in the Berezne.

137 00:07:34,610 --> 00:07:35,940 And you knew this?

138 00:07:35,940 --> 00:07:36,440 We knew it.

139 00:07:36,440 --> 00:07:37,640 You knew it?

140 00:07:37,640 --> 00:07:39,500 We knew it already after this.

141 00:07:39,500 --> 00:07:45,230 We knew what was going on because people, peasants, would

142

00:07:45,230 --> 00:07:47,550 tell and to bring us the news.

143

00:07:47,550 --> 00:07:50,470 So when we were in the forest, there was interesting story.

144

00:07:50,470 --> 00:07:53,570 My uncle, we thought that the whole family was dead.

145

00:07:53,570 --> 00:08:01,640 So my uncle picked 10 trees to represent a minyan.

146

00:08:01,640 --> 00:08:02,900 He put on the Tallis--

147

00:08:02,900 --> 00:08:04,850 he always carried the Tallis.

148

00:08:04,850 --> 00:08:09,360 And he put it, and he said Kaddish for his family

149

00:08:09,360 --> 00:08:12,270 and for us because we thought that they're probably

150

00:08:12,270 --> 00:08:14,890 dead by now and they'll never come out.

151

00:08:14,890 --> 00:08:18,610 And he said Kaddish for the family.

152

00:08:18,610 --> 00:08:21,580 We will for a little while just along

153 00:08:21,580 --> 00:08:24,440 going for sometimes to a farm.

154 00:08:24,440 --> 00:08:28,255 And then we heard that my mother and my aunt, they did survive,

155 00:08:28,255 --> 00:08:30,100 and they were hiding somewhere, so we

156 00:08:30,100 --> 00:08:33,220 had a reunion in the forest, a very happy reunion.

157 00:08:33,220 --> 00:08:35,500 At least they were alive, and all this

158 00:08:35,500 --> 00:08:38,530 because my cousin, who was only a year older than me,

159 00:08:38,530 --> 00:08:42,970 had enough sense and enough presence of mind to say,

160 00:08:42,970 --> 00:08:45,130 we're getting out.

161 00:08:45,130 --> 00:08:47,650 If they would have stayed overnight,

162 00:08:47,650 --> 00:08:49,600 they would have had to dig their own ditches

163 00:08:49,600 --> 00:08:51,520 and would have been shot like everyone, 164 00:08:51,520 --> 00:08:53,350 all the Jews in the ghetto.

165 00:08:53,350 --> 00:08:55,880 When you were older, did you ask your mother,

166 00:08:55,880 --> 00:08:58,730 why did you listen to this little boy?

167 00:08:58,730 --> 00:09:01,950 Because he was 11 years, 12 years old or something.

168 00:09:01,950 --> 00:09:02,840 No, she listened.

169 00:09:02,840 --> 00:09:03,470 She went.

170 00:09:03,470 --> 00:09:05,410 She followed my cousin.

171 00:09:05,410 --> 00:09:06,330 Why did she listen?

172 00:09:06,330 --> 00:09:09,470 Because nobody was smart.

173 00:09:09,470 --> 00:09:13,340 He could have gone out of the ghetto

174 00:09:13,340 --> 00:09:16,220 and then stabbed by the police or shot on the highway.

175 00:09:16,220 --> 00:09:18,055 There was nothing foolproof. 00:09:18,055 --> 00:09:20,150 But you live in the ghetto, you got out,

177 00:09:20,150 --> 00:09:21,990 you were taking a chance.

178 00:09:21,990 --> 00:09:23,870 And when you're still alive, you say

179 00:09:23,870 --> 00:09:26,330 maybe it's just a false rumor.

180 00:09:26,330 --> 00:09:29,060 Maybe they want-- we lived by the rumors.

181 00:09:29,060 --> 00:09:32,870 Maybe they just came to relocate us, maybe something.

182 00:09:32,870 --> 00:09:37,220 Nobody right away wanted to accept the fact

183 00:09:37,220 --> 00:09:39,140 that this was it.

184 00:09:39,140 --> 00:09:42,480 So once we were reunited, we stayed together,

185 00:09:42,480 --> 00:09:45,920 my uncle, and his wife, and his three children,

186 00:09:45,920 --> 00:09:47,660 and my mother, and father, and us.

187 00:09:47,660 --> 00:09:50,690 And we were going from farmer to farmer.

188 00:09:50,690 --> 00:09:53,210 Some of them were very kind and would

189 00:09:53,210 --> 00:09:58,550 let us stay, spend a couple of nights in there

190 00:09:58,550 --> 00:10:02,160 of hiding in hay.

191 00:10:02,160 --> 00:10:02,870 What do you it?

192 00:10:02,870 --> 00:10:04,550 The barn.

193 00:10:04,550 --> 00:10:06,710 And then at night, they would come out

194 00:10:06,710 --> 00:10:08,550 and they would give us some food.

195 00:10:08,550 --> 00:10:11,030 They were taking a chance of their lives,

196 00:10:11,030 --> 00:10:14,270 because if a neighbor's child would come over and see us

197 00:10:14,270 --> 00:10:19,550 there, they could tell on us.

198 00:10:19,550 --> 00:10:23,840 And they would kill not us, but also

199

00:10:23,840 --> 00:10:26,330 kill the people who were hiding us.

200

00:10:26,330 --> 00:10:27,350 Life was cheap.

201

00:10:27,350 --> 00:10:34,380 For a pound of salt, anybody could turn in to do.

202

00:10:34,380 --> 00:10:35,770 Salt was a big commodity.

203

00:10:35,770 --> 00:10:36,937 What did they care?

204

00:10:36,937 --> 00:10:38,770 Got the Jew, they give them a pound of salt.

205

00:10:38,770 --> 00:10:40,560 So they would let us stay sometimes

206

00:10:40,560 --> 00:10:44,850 for a few nights, until they felt it was dangerous.

207

00:10:44,850 --> 00:10:46,800 And I recall one thing as a child.

208

00:10:46,800 --> 00:10:50,340 I was sitting in hiding in the barn in the hay,

209

00:10:50,340 --> 00:10:53,310 and I made a little opening to see what's doing.

210

00:10:53,310 --> 00:10:54,640 This was daytime. 211 00:10:54,640 --> 00:10:57,210 And I see all the chicken running around.

212

00:10:57,210 --> 00:11:02,820 And I said, God, why don't you change me into a chicken,

213

00:11:02,820 --> 00:11:04,080 because take a look.

214

00:11:04,080 --> 00:11:09,150 They can be free and run around, and I have to sit in here.

215

00:11:09,150 --> 00:11:13,460 God, make me one of the domestic animals or something,

216

00:11:13,460 --> 00:11:14,670 the wishful thing.

217

00:11:14,670 --> 00:11:17,610 But we would stay in one place, then go to the forest

218

00:11:17,610 --> 00:11:20,020 and stay a few days, then go somewhere else.

219

00:11:20,020 --> 00:11:24,210 But basically what we tried to do is go east.

220

00:11:24,210 --> 00:11:27,680 Maybe we'll still catch up somewhere.

221

00:11:27,680 --> 00:11:30,330

We wanted to be on the Russian territory, 222

00:11:30,330 --> 00:11:33,330 pre-war Russian territory, because they were not

223

00:11:33,330 --> 00:11:35,370 so anti-Semitic.

224

00:11:35,370 --> 00:11:38,610 So we would stay in there.

225

00:11:38,610 --> 00:11:41,550 Some other people would come and join us, the survivors,

226

00:11:41,550 --> 00:11:42,420 stay a little.

227

00:11:42,420 --> 00:11:43,640 We'll hear the stories.

228

00:11:43,640 --> 00:11:47,190 And they will go away, hoping they can find

229

00:11:47,190 --> 00:11:49,180 some relatives in the forest.

230

00:11:49,180 --> 00:11:51,300 So this was an ongoing thing.

231

00:11:51,300 --> 00:11:54,970 What we needed the most for survival in the forest

232

00:11:54,970 --> 00:11:59,280 is two very important things, is to have an ax, so we

233

00:11:59,280 --> 00:12:06,300 can chop wood and then make a tipi or something, and also

234

00:12:06,300 --> 00:12:10,600 a shovel to dig a hole, so we can have water.

235

00:12:10,600 --> 00:12:12,660 So those things were essential for survival.

236

00:12:12,660 --> 00:12:14,490 So you made something like a tent?

237

00:12:14,490 --> 00:12:16,440 Correct, yeah, we had it like this.

238

00:12:16,440 --> 00:12:20,160 We put all the trees and just left and opening to in.

239

00:12:20,160 --> 00:12:23,580 The fire was always in the center.

240

00:12:23,580 --> 00:12:25,660 And it would come out through the chimney.

241

00:12:25,660 --> 00:12:29,280 So we were laying with our heads to the fire.

242

00:12:29,280 --> 00:12:32,280 And then to eat, if we didn't have food,

243

00:12:32,280 --> 00:12:34,920 there were always mushrooms.

244

00:12:34,920 --> 00:12:37,350

There were berries.

00:12:37,350 --> 00:12:42,150 And then at night, the grown ups would

246 00:12:42,150 --> 00:12:43,650 leave me and my little cousin alone,

247 00:12:43,650 --> 00:12:47,760 and they would go into the fields to look for food.

248 00:12:47,760 --> 00:12:50,700 They could dig up potatoes.

249 00:12:50,700 --> 00:12:55,930 They could dig up corn, because at night, they felt secure.

250 00:12:55,930 --> 00:12:57,750 And if they knew somebody who would

251 00:12:57,750 --> 00:13:00,960 be sympathetic to the Jews, they would go in

252 00:13:00,960 --> 00:13:05,160 and then the person give them maybe some other food.

253 00:13:05,160 --> 00:13:06,690 But you had to be careful.

254 00:13:06,690 --> 00:13:10,230 You never knew even who's going to turn you in.

255 00:13:10,230 --> 00:13:12,570 And then all these people who all

256 00:13:12,570 --> 00:13:14,970 stay together, they would come back

257

00:13:14,970 --> 00:13:16,940 when the sun would come out.

258

00:13:16,940 --> 00:13:20,310 You had to return to the forest before the sun--

259

 $00:13:20,310 \longrightarrow 00:13:24,120$

260

00:13:24,120 --> 00:13:27,490 before it was daytime to get out of there.

261

00:13:27,490 --> 00:13:29,790 And then we'll all sit down and told rumors.

262

00:13:29,790 --> 00:13:31,680 So what did you hear?

263

00:13:31,680 --> 00:13:33,690 So where is the front now?

264

00:13:33,690 --> 00:13:35,560 So where is this going?

265

00:13:35,560 --> 00:13:40,080 And then we also used to--

266

00:13:40,080 --> 00:13:45,520 it's silly, but we gave a lot of credence to dreams.

267

00:13:45,520 --> 00:13:47,760 We'd get up in the morning, and we would say, so

268

00:13:47,760 --> 00:13:49,170

what did you dream?

269

00:13:49,170 --> 00:13:51,480 And this person said,

I had a dream of this.

270

00:13:51,480 --> 00:13:52,020 That's good.

271

00:13:52,020 --> 00:13:53,500

That's a good sign.

272

00:13:53,500 --> 00:13:58,650

Jews have this capacity of always

273

00:13:58,650 --> 00:14:02,415 we survived so many wars

that to interpret it,

274

00:14:02,415 --> 00:14:03,540

something will be for good.

275

00:14:03,540 --> 00:14:04,260

That's a good sign.

276

00:14:04,260 --> 00:14:05,925

If you dreamed about this and this and this,

277

00:14:05,925 --> 00:14:08,490

it's going to be good for us,

or maybe we won't be caught,

278

00:14:08,490 --> 00:14:10,400

or maybe we'll get one.

279

00:14:10,400 --> 00:14:14,550

So we also would exchange

stories about dreams.

280

00:14:14,550 --> 00:14:16,050

We had the food.

281

00:14:16,050 --> 00:14:20,020 And at night, when all the grownups went to look for food,

282

 $00:14:20,020 \longrightarrow 00:14:22,740$ and I was left alone with my little cousin, who was maybe

283

 $00:14:22,740 \longrightarrow 00:14:26,760$ about four years younger than me, we sat by the fire,

284

00:14:26,760 --> 00:14:29,580 just all alone, and we could hear

285

00:14:29,580 --> 00:14:34,890 the bears howling, because they saw people in the wood.

286

00:14:34,890 --> 00:14:37,313 But they never came in, inside.

287

00:14:37,313 --> 00:14:37,980 They were there.

288

00:14:37,980 --> 00:14:39,570 But could see them all running.

289

00:14:39,570 --> 00:14:43,500 And we had to be very quiet while we were in the woods,

290

00:14:43,500 --> 00:14:46,920 so nobody would find, because anybody,

291

00:14:46,920 --> 00:14:49,500 shepherds who were tending to cows

292

00:14:49,500 --> 00:14:52,240 or whatever, if they would see a Jew, they can come home

293

00:14:52,240 --> 00:14:52,740 and tell.

294

00:14:52,740 --> 00:14:55,560 And the minute we saw that somebody saw us,

295

00:14:55,560 --> 00:15:02,100 we had to change the place, run, because the chances of them

296

00:15:02,100 --> 00:15:04,500 telling us were very great.

297

00:15:04,500 --> 00:15:07,050 So we just walked, and we decided

298

00:15:07,050 --> 00:15:12,270 to go on Russian territory, Russian pre-war territory,

299

00:15:12,270 --> 00:15:15,660 which meant to cross the River Sluch.

300

00:15:15,660 --> 00:15:17,830 To cross the river, there was no bridge.

301

00:15:17,830 --> 00:15:20,880 There was just a very narrow railroad,

302

00:15:20,880 --> 00:15:25,270 because the Polish people used it to transport something

00:15:25,270 --> 00:15:26,200 from carriage.

304

00:15:26,200 --> 00:15:27,840 They were building fortifications.

305

00:15:27,840 --> 00:15:30,750 They thought they were going to fight with the Russians.

306

00:15:30,750 --> 00:15:33,840 So the river was very wide.

307

00:15:33,840 --> 00:15:36,300 And we had to cross it.

308

00:15:36,300 --> 00:15:40,500 And to go from one of--

309

00:15:40,500 --> 00:15:42,600 what we call this thing in here-- to another,

310

00:15:42,600 --> 00:15:46,270 you could see the water underneath.

311

00:15:46,270 --> 00:15:49,870 So if you missed and you didn't step right--

312

00:15:49,870 --> 00:15:50,790 Was there stones?

313

00:15:50,790 --> 00:15:51,290 No.

314

00:15:51,290 --> 00:15:53,970 There were just two tracks, and there were ties.

00:15:53,970 --> 00:15:55,320 Is that what you call them?

316

00:15:55,320 --> 00:15:56,850 So you had to walk on these?

317

00:15:56,850 --> 00:16:00,960 We had to walk on the ties, make sure not to miss,

318

00:16:00,960 --> 00:16:05,510 because if you missed it, you would fall into the river.

319

00:16:05,510 --> 00:16:10,332 My uncle carried my little cousin on her back.

320

00:16:10,332 --> 00:16:11,040 So wait a minute.

321

00:16:11,040 --> 00:16:15,000 That's above the water.

322

00:16:15,000 --> 00:16:16,410 Above the water.

323

00:16:16,410 --> 00:16:18,270 So you could really fall and hurt yourself?

324

00:16:18,270 --> 00:16:20,340 We could have, if you don't fall.

325

00:16:20,340 --> 00:16:21,540 This was little.

326

00:16:21,540 --> 00:16:23,160 It was a very narrow.

327

00:16:23,160 --> 00:16:26,610

This was the little tracks, and there were just

328

00:16:26,610 --> 00:16:27,360 ties going across.

329

00:16:27,360 --> 00:16:28,860 It wasn't meant to walk on.

330

00:16:28,860 --> 00:16:32,050 They used to push little carts with sand,

331

00:16:32,050 --> 00:16:34,650 the samples they were building.

332

00:16:34,650 --> 00:16:40,230 Until we crossed the river, we felt already being on Russian--

333

00:16:40,230 --> 00:16:42,950 so-called Russian, it wasn't Russian anymore-- territory,

334

00:16:42,950 --> 00:16:44,700 we were relieved, because we knew

335

00:16:44,700 --> 00:16:50,730 the people will be kind to us, that they will not turn us in.

336

00:16:50,730 --> 00:16:56,440 And they were, after all, former Russian citizens.

337

00:16:56,440 --> 00:17:02,050 So they were not buddy buddy with the Nazis.

338

00:17:02,050 --> 00:17:08,270 So once we came there and we sat, down,

339

00:17:08,270 --> 00:17:12,380 the Germans did know more that there were a lot of Jews hiding

340

00:17:12,380 --> 00:17:13,119 in the forest.

341

00:17:13,119 --> 00:17:13,619 They knew?

342

00:17:13,619 --> 00:17:14,300 They knew it.

343

00:17:14,300 --> 00:17:15,170 They did, yeah.

344

00:17:15,170 --> 00:17:19,760 They knew it through the Ukraine and whoever used to tell them.

345

00:17:19,760 --> 00:17:22,220 They knew the Jews, there were a lot of Jews hiding.

346

00:17:22,220 --> 00:17:27,865 But there used to be a rumor saying that Germans are not

347

00:17:27,865 --> 00:17:28,490 country people.

348

00:17:28,490 --> 00:17:29,450 They're city people.

349

00:17:29,450 --> 00:17:32,480 They will never go into a forest to look

350

00:17:32,480 --> 00:17:36,860 for people, because they don't know how to get around.

351 00:17:36,860 --> 00:17:40,340 So if anything, they relied on sometimes the plane

352

00:17:40,340 --> 00:17:45,380 would fly over our heads, because just looking in.

353

00:17:45,380 --> 00:17:50,720 And sometimes you could hear troops,

354

00:17:50,720 --> 00:17:52,970 and we hear this going on, we knew it's time

355

00:17:52,970 --> 00:17:55,160 to move to another place.

356

00:17:55,160 --> 00:18:02,640 And once we came, as I said, on this Russian territory,

357

00:18:02,640 --> 00:18:07,290 some person told us that if you go in this and this house,

358

00:18:07,290 --> 00:18:13,210 there are some Russian partisans and to meet them,

359

00:18:13,210 --> 00:18:16,750 and maybe they can help your or whatever it is.

360

00:18:16,750 --> 00:18:18,100 We were elated.

361

00:18:18,100 --> 00:18:21,030 Anything Russian felt good to us. 362

00:18:21,030 --> 00:18:23,550 It meant that the Germans were left way behind us.

363

00:18:23,550 --> 00:18:27,600 They were on the other side of the Sluch River.

364

00:18:27,600 --> 00:18:31,950 And we didn't even think that they were anywhere around here.

365

00:18:31,950 --> 00:18:35,280 So my father and my uncle went into this house,

366

00:18:35,280 --> 00:18:37,770 and they met with the partisans.

367

00:18:37,770 --> 00:18:40,560 They were-- I don't know who the exact people.

368

00:18:40,560 --> 00:18:45,150 That were just Russian, just local people

369

00:18:45,150 --> 00:18:47,320 who worked for the partisans.

370

00:18:47,320 --> 00:18:52,230 They were keeping guard to let the partisans know

371

00:18:52,230 --> 00:18:54,550 the Germans are coming or something.

372

00:18:54,550 --> 00:18:57,960 So when my father and my uncle came and asked could we 00:18:57,960 --> 00:19:02,220 join the partisans, they took us in,

374

00:19:02,220 --> 00:19:06,240 because we were a three member family, my parents and myself.

375

00:19:06,240 --> 00:19:08,580 First of all, I was not a baby anymore.

376

00:19:08,580 --> 00:19:12,570 And my father had a rifle, or a gun.

377

00:19:12,570 --> 00:19:15,270 So he knew how to shoot.

378

00:19:15,270 --> 00:19:18,270 My mother knew how to cook.

379

00:19:18,270 --> 00:19:20,460 So we were really a help to them.

380

00:19:20,460 --> 00:19:22,260 So they took us in.

381

00:19:22,260 --> 00:19:23,760 But they wouldn't take in my uncle,

382

00:19:23,760 --> 00:19:27,510 because they didn't come to save the Jews.

383

00:19:27,510 --> 00:19:31,800 They took us as more if we can help them for something,

384

00:19:31,800 --> 00:19:33,420 which makes sense.

385 00:19:33,420 --> 00:19:36,000 So once we got into the partisan,

386 00:19:36,000 --> 00:19:39,120 they were just elated to know that there

387 00:19:39,120 --> 00:19:44,860 were some people here who actually came from Moscow.

388 00:19:44,860 --> 00:19:46,500 How much can you ask for?

389 00:19:46,500 --> 00:19:50,610 We just absolutely couldn't believe the good fortune.

390 00:19:50,610 --> 00:19:54,060 And this is what happened once we got there.

391 00:19:54,060 --> 00:19:56,550 There was still a very small group of people,

392 00:19:56,550 --> 00:20:00,270 because the Medvedev partisans were just beginning

393 00:20:00,270 --> 00:20:04,170 to form, maybe about 50 people.

394 00:20:04,170 --> 00:20:09,070 And we were also anxious to help to them.

395 00:20:09,070 --> 00:20:10,740 So my mother cooked. 00:20:10,740 --> 00:20:12,150 My father had the rifle.

397

00:20:12,150 --> 00:20:14,430 And whenever the people were going to look for food

398

00:20:14,430 --> 00:20:17,310 or whatever they wanted, he was going with them.

399

00:20:17,310 --> 00:20:19,290 And I worked with sick people.

400

00:20:19,290 --> 00:20:21,270 They called it [INAUDIBLE].

401

00:20:21,270 --> 00:20:27,135 And what I used to do is we didn't have bandages.

402

00:20:27,135 --> 00:20:30,870 Whenever somebody was hurt or wounded,

403

00:20:30,870 --> 00:20:34,180 you take off the bandage, you wash it by hand,

404

00:20:34,180 --> 00:20:36,810 you put it in a pot where the bandages

405

00:20:36,810 --> 00:20:39,810 would boil, sterilize them, and dry it, and roll it

406

00:20:39,810 --> 00:20:42,100 up, and reuse them over again.

407

00:20:42,100 --> 00:20:43,950 So I was helpful in this way.

408 00:20:43,950 --> 00:20:48,180 I would sit with the sick people and change the bandage.

409 00:20:48,180 --> 00:20:50,700 I used to know how to do [? cupping ?],, as I told you,

410 00:20:50,700 --> 00:20:52,330 [? banki ?],, as we say in Russian,

411 00:20:52,330 --> 00:20:54,690 all out cure for everything.

412 00:20:54,690 --> 00:20:57,270 I also you'll have to take a rifle apart,

413 00:20:57,270 --> 00:21:01,875 to take a rifle apart, clean it, and put it together.

414 00:21:01,875 --> 00:21:03,870 So I learned that too.

415 00:21:03,870 --> 00:21:06,900 And then, just before leaving for Moscow,

416 00:21:06,900 --> 00:21:10,330 I remember I was trying to learn how to ride a horse.

417 00:21:10,330 --> 00:21:12,460 And it didn't go very well.

418 00:21:12,460 --> 00:21:16,950 But the idea was we were so grateful that they took us in,

419 00:21:16,950 --> 00:21:22,950 and they protected us after all, they were in touch with Moscow.

420

00:21:22,950 --> 00:21:26,570 They had a few people who were in constant radio

421

00:21:26,570 --> 00:21:32,120 contact with Moscow and taking orders what to do.

422

00:21:32,120 --> 00:21:34,660 And we were not alone anymore.

423

00:21:34,660 --> 00:21:37,362

424

00:21:37,362 --> 00:21:41,070 Out of gratitude, we didn't know what to do more.

425

00:21:41,070 --> 00:21:43,460 So I felt very good too.

426

00:21:43,460 --> 00:21:46,490 I was needed too, even as young as I was.

427

00:21:46,490 --> 00:21:48,470 You were 12 by then.

428

00:21:48,470 --> 00:21:49,370 Let's se in 19--

429

00:21:49,370 --> 00:21:53,510 I was about 12, yeah, 12, 13, something like that.

430

00:21:53,510 --> 00:21:58,430 And then I remember I learned--

431

00:21:58,430 --> 00:22:01,670

it was on the job training.

432

00:22:01,670 --> 00:22:06,110 They even taught me once, I remember, to give a shot.

433

00:22:06,110 --> 00:22:08,590 But we didn't have any penicillin.

434

00:22:08,590 --> 00:22:10,790 We didn't have any of the latest thing.

435

00:22:10,790 --> 00:22:14,780 Sometimes a plane would come in at night and land

436

00:22:14,780 --> 00:22:16,220 and bring us some--

437

00:22:16,220 --> 00:22:18,110 I don't know if maybe--

438

00:22:18,110 --> 00:22:22,710 I don't think penicillin even existed then, but bring

439

00:22:22,710 --> 00:22:24,440 some medication.

440

00:22:24,440 --> 00:22:28,580 But we relied on ourselves with the people.

441

00:22:28,580 --> 00:22:33,200 We had two doctors on the premises, one doctor who

442

00:22:33,200 --> 00:22:37,080 flown in from Moscow, Dr. [? Sasarki. ?]

443

00:22:37,080 --> 00:22:38,890 He was handsome tall man.

444

00:22:38,890 --> 00:22:41,940 He was an artist in private life.

445

00:22:41,940 --> 00:22:47,490 But he volunteered to go ahead and be in the path to help.

446

00:22:47,490 --> 00:22:50,250 They called it the Motherland.

447

00:22:50,250 --> 00:22:52,500 So he was parachuted in.

448

00:22:52,500 --> 00:22:56,220 Then we had a Jewish family with us, Dr. Martin.

449

00:22:56,220 --> 00:22:59,880 And they took him in with the two tiny children, two

450

00:22:59,880 --> 00:23:02,970 or three years old, because they needed him.

451

00:23:02,970 --> 00:23:05,230 He was an all round too.

452

00:23:05,230 --> 00:23:09,450 He could do operations.

453

00:23:09,450 --> 00:23:15,210 He could do whatever was needed, to amputate legs.

454

00:23:15,210 --> 00:23:16,620 He could do abortions.

455 00:23:16,620 --> 00:23:18,930 He could do everything that was needed.

456 00:23:18,930 --> 00:23:23,610 It was a makeshift little place, where they put branches along.

457 00:23:23,610 --> 00:23:27,780 And he didn't even have any instruments.

458 00:23:27,780 --> 00:23:36,630 They used the saw that you use for sawing wood or something.

459 00:23:36,630 --> 00:23:38,790 And they sort of wiped it and sterilized it.

460 00:23:38,790 --> 00:23:43,980 They did have maybe some alcohol and maybe set a match,

461 00:23:43,980 --> 00:23:45,540 and anyhow to try to--

462 00:23:45,540 --> 00:23:51,300 and they amputated the legs for one guy I know very well.

463 00:23:51,300 --> 00:23:54,570 I used to change his bandages below the knee,

464 00:23:54,570 --> 00:23:56,430 because he got gangrene.

465 00:23:56,430 --> 00:24:01,710 And if he didn't cut off the legs, and he survived.

466

00:24:01,710 --> 00:24:03,750 They sent him later to Moscow.

467

00:24:03,750 --> 00:24:05,970 God knows how this happened.

468

00:24:05,970 --> 00:24:09,630 But we had no medicine.

469

00:24:09,630 --> 00:24:11,820 People did get sick.

470

00:24:11,820 --> 00:24:13,770 They had scarlet fever.

471

00:24:13,770 --> 00:24:20,550 They had typhoid fever because of the dirt, the water.

472

00:24:20,550 --> 00:24:22,650 And if you had anything, like I remember,

473

00:24:22,650 --> 00:24:25,900 I had a scratch or a sore on my leg.

474

00:24:25,900 --> 00:24:27,180 There was no bandages too.

475

00:24:27,180 --> 00:24:32,000 But by word of mouth, my father told me

476

00:24:32,000 --> 00:24:36,270 you took certain leaves that have medicinal properties,

477

00:24:36,270 --> 00:24:42,460 and you put that leaf on it and just cover it up,

00:24:42,460 --> 00:24:48,340 and by God, after a while, the sore would disappear.

479 00:24:48,340 --> 00:24:51,250 I still see that leaf in front of me.

480 00:24:51,250 --> 00:24:54,220 But my parents living on the farm

481 00:24:54,220 --> 00:24:59,860 knew, and my uncle, certain things about vegetations

482 00:24:59,860 --> 00:25:01,990 and all on their property.

483 00:25:01,990 --> 00:25:05,980 So this was the medicine for sores.

484 00:25:05,980 --> 00:25:06,940 This guy survived.

485 00:25:06,940 --> 00:25:10,390

486 00:25:10,390 --> 00:25:14,920 As I said, I used to take off this, and his bandage,

487 00:25:14,920 --> 00:25:20,200 take it off, wash it, and dry it, and another one,

488 00:25:20,200 --> 00:25:21,850 and then put it back on.

489 00:25:21,850 --> 00:25:24,580 The only thing I was told to do is 490 00:25:24,580 --> 00:25:27,550 take cotton dip it in alcohol or something

491 00:25:27,550 --> 00:25:31,060 and just wipe the wound and put it back on.

492 00:25:31,060 --> 00:25:34,690 And he had a sense of humor.

493 00:25:34,690 --> 00:25:37,960 The reason why this happened to him,

494 00:25:37,960 --> 00:25:44,160 because one time the Germans did find out where we were.

495 00:25:44,160 --> 00:25:47,720 And they start closing in on us.

496 00:25:47,720 --> 00:25:52,700 And we, the partisans, started to run.

497 00:25:52,700 --> 00:25:56,120 He got, for some reason, detached from the group.

498 00:25:56,120 --> 00:25:58,790 He got lost in the forest.

499 00:25:58,790 --> 00:26:00,710 And he was a radio operator.

500 00:26:00,710 --> 00:26:03,107 He carried his radio on his back.

501 00:26:03,107 --> 00:26:04,190 He got lost in the forest.

502

00:26:04,190 --> 00:26:08,450 For about two or three days, he couldn't find us.

503

 $00:26:08,450 \longrightarrow 00:26:10,760$ So he got frostbitten.

504

00:26:10,760 --> 00:26:12,740 He legs got frostbitten.

505

00:26:12,740 --> 00:26:14,870 By the time he did find us already,

506

00:26:14,870 --> 00:26:17,030 the rest of the group of the partisans,

507

00:26:17,030 --> 00:26:20,990 he was already had gangrene set in his legs.

508

00:26:20,990 --> 00:26:24,500 And they had to, as I said, they amputated his legs.

509

00:26:24,500 --> 00:26:26,690 And he survived.

510

00:26:26,690 --> 00:26:30,350 He used to sit and tell some jokes.

511

 $00:26:30,350 \longrightarrow 00:26:34,550$ And then he was sent to Moscow later

512

00:26:34,550 --> 00:26:38,402 on with some other wounded people.

513

00:26:38,402 --> 00:26:40,360 Would you like to talk more about the partisans

514

00:26:40,360 --> 00:26:41,215 or am I going too fast?

515

00:26:41,215 --> 00:26:43,215 I'm going to go back a little bit to the ghetto,

516

00:26:43,215 --> 00:26:44,470 just for a second.

517

00:26:44,470 --> 00:26:48,100 You said that the women were hysterical,

518

00:26:48,100 --> 00:26:50,080 so you didn't want to stay with them.

519

00:26:50,080 --> 00:26:52,930 That's why you wanted to go with your father and uncle.

520

00:26:52,930 --> 00:26:55,090 What were the women like, versus what the men were

521

00:26:55,090 --> 00:26:56,298 like, as far as what you saw?

522

00:26:56,298 --> 00:26:58,858 I'll tell you, because men had more strength.

523

00:26:58,858 --> 00:26:59,650 They were stronger.

524

00:26:59,650 --> 00:27:01,810 They were more logical.
