- 1 00:00:00,000 --> 00:00:01,190 It's OK, it's OK.
- 2 00:00:01,190 --> 00:00:02,610 It's OK.
- 3 00:00:02,610 --> 00:00:03,860 OK, we are rolling.
- 4 00:00:03,860 --> 00:00:04,810 OK.
- 5 00:00:04,810 --> 00:00:05,980 Now we are on?
- 6 00:00:05,980 --> 00:00:07,320 Now we are on.
- 7 00:00:07,320 --> 00:00:14,070 So where we left off before was that you had made it
- 8 00:00:14,070 --> 00:00:19,018 back to Prague after a most unusual kind of way
- 9 00:00:19,018 --> 00:00:19,810 of being liberated.
- 10 00:00:19,810 --> 00:00:21,450 Oh yeah, when I left, yes, yes.
- 11 00:00:21,450 --> 00:00:22,950 That's how it was.
- 12 00:00:22,950 --> 00:00:28,100 And you were at your sister's house, or your cousin's house
- 13 00:00:28,100 --> 00:00:29,100

who had married someone.

14 00:00:29,100 --> 00:00:32,009 Tell me again, whose house did you go to when you came back

15 00:00:32,009 --> 00:00:32,509 to Prague?

16 00:00:32,509 --> 00:00:34,438 That was my wife's sister.

17 00:00:34,438 --> 00:00:35,230 Your sister-in-law.

18 00:00:35,230 --> 00:00:35,730 Georgine.

19 00:00:35,730 --> 00:00:37,410 Sister-- that would be my sister-in-law.

20 00:00:37,410 --> 00:00:37,970 That's correct.

21 00:00:37,970 --> 00:00:38,720 What was her name?

22 00:00:38,720 --> 00:00:39,750

23 00:00:39,750 --> 00:00:42,088 In English, Patricia.

24 00:00:42,088 --> 00:00:42,630 And in Czech?

25 00:00:42,630 --> 00:00:43,955 In Czech, Vlasta.

26 00:00:43,955 --> 00:00:44,780 Vlasta.

27 00:00:44,780 --> 00:00:46,980 Vlasta is Patricia in English.

28 00:00:46,980 --> 00:00:47,610 I never knew.

29 00:00:47,610 --> 00:00:48,110 [LAUGHING]

30 00:00:48,110 --> 00:00:49,230 I never knew.

31 00:00:49,230 --> 00:00:50,540 OK.

32 00:00:50,540 --> 00:00:54,180 Vlasta is Patricia in English.

33 00:00:54,180 --> 00:00:59,250 And was her home in the center of Prague?

34 00:00:59,250 --> 00:01:03,000 No, she was living in Liben.

35 00:01:03,000 --> 00:01:05,040 I don't remember the street anymore,

36 00:01:05,040 --> 00:01:07,930 but so many years since we are--

37 00:01:07,930 --> 00:01:08,430 Of course

38 00:01:08,430 --> 00:01:10,094 Out of there, you know?

39 00:01:10,094 --> 00:01:12,370 So was it a residential neighborhood,

40

00:01:12,370 --> 00:01:13,620 or was it a city neighborhood?

41

00:01:13,620 --> 00:01:15,495 No, that was a residential neighborhood, yes.

42

00:01:15,495 --> 00:01:16,590 A city neighborhood, or--

43

00:01:16,590 --> 00:01:20,900 It was very nice, and again, you know,

44

00:01:20,900 --> 00:01:24,890 when these deportations started, you always said,

45

00:01:24,890 --> 00:01:27,600 well, we have to be somewhere when we come back.

46

00:01:27,600 --> 00:01:30,760 Nobody ever thought that you will not come back.

47

00:01:30,760 --> 00:01:31,260 Come back.

48

00:01:31,260 --> 00:01:33,030 So you assumed you would come back,

49

00:01:33,030 --> 00:01:36,420 and you should have some place where you will, quote, "meet."

50

00:01:36,420 --> 00:01:39,060 And Vlasta, was she able to stay there because she 51 00:01:39,060 --> 00:01:40,140 was married to a non-Jew?

52 00:01:40,140 --> 00:01:43,200 She was married to a non-Jew, but that actually

53 00:01:43,200 --> 00:01:47,490 was a surprise that she somehow managed not to be involved.

54 00:01:47,490 --> 00:01:50,740 Because that was not an excuse, she was Jewish.

55 00:01:50,740 --> 00:01:53,940 So under normal circumstances of that time,

56 00:01:53,940 --> 00:01:57,030 she would have had the same difficulties.

57 00:01:57,030 --> 00:02:00,660 But for some strange reason, nobody knew,

58 00:02:00,660 --> 00:02:04,140 the name was of course Czech, she married somebody

59 00:02:04,140 --> 00:02:06,180 by the name of KrejcÃ.

60 00:02:06,180 --> 00:02:06,680 KrejcÃ.

61 00:02:06,680 --> 00:02:10,830 Now, Krejcà is like a small tailor in English. 00:02:10,830 --> 00:02:12,540 So the name was of course, Czech,

63 00:02:12,540 --> 00:02:17,350 and she was married to him for quite a while.

64 00:02:17,350 --> 00:02:22,850 Well, they had been all older than me, but I remember him.

65 00:02:22,850 --> 00:02:24,510 And she came here a couple of times.

66 00:02:24,510 --> 00:02:26,730 We have a picture, we have a-- which I mentioned

67 00:02:26,730 --> 00:02:28,060 to you, a swimming pool.

68 00:02:28,060 --> 00:02:28,560 Yeah.

69 00:02:28,560 --> 00:02:30,700 It is covered, you don't see it.

70 00:02:30,700 --> 00:02:32,252 You can only see the--

71 00:02:32,252 --> 00:02:33,030 The rim.

72 00:02:33,030 --> 00:02:34,650 The rim.

73 00:02:34,650 --> 00:02:38,940 But there were quite a few, somehow, survivors. 00:02:38,940 --> 00:02:42,810 Well, not even survivors, people who were born here.

75 00:02:42,810 --> 00:02:45,818 I told you about this uncle who was living in Ecuador.

76 00:02:45,818 --> 00:02:46,360 That's right.

77 00:02:46,360 --> 00:02:49,060 So naturally, from this side, there were--

78 00:02:49,060 --> 00:02:51,800 the picture shows quite a few people, you know.

79 00:02:51,800 --> 00:02:55,545 OK, so when you're back, and she sees you,

80 00:02:55,545 --> 00:02:57,540 could she recognize you when she saw you?

81 00:02:57,540 --> 00:02:58,780 Oh yes, yes, yes.

82 00:02:58,780 --> 00:02:59,790 Even without the hair.

83 00:02:59,790 --> 00:03:01,860 I mean, now I have normally no hair.

84 00:03:01,860 --> 00:03:05,112 But at the time, it was short cut, you know.

85 00:03:05,112 --> 00:03:07,830 And the language, you hear the same voice.

86 00:03:07,830 --> 00:03:11,430 And, yes, so I had no problem with that part, no.

87 00:03:11,430 --> 00:03:14,130 And especially, the bathroom.

88 00:03:14,130 --> 00:03:17,230 Now, you know, you are human.

89 00:03:17,230 --> 00:03:20,230 So when you go to the bathroom, you know what happen.

90 00:03:20,230 --> 00:03:23,520 You have to clean yourself and wash up yourself.

91 00:03:23,520 --> 00:03:27,780 That's something which didn't exist in Australia--

92 00:03:27,780 --> 00:03:30,230 in Auschwitz.

93 00:03:30,230 --> 00:03:32,330 There were no bathrooms.

94 00:03:32,330 --> 00:03:34,620 There was a piece of wood, and you had to sit down,

95 00:03:34,620 --> 00:03:37,540 and do what you did, and there was no water.

96 00:03:37,540 --> 00:03:44,610 So you really, your personal esteem, or hygiene, or whatever 00:03:44,610 --> 00:03:48,080 you want to call it was absolutely non-existent,

98 00:03:48,080 --> 00:03:49,170 you know.

99 00:03:49,170 --> 00:03:54,030 Just think of it, what she was talking about, that underwear.

100 00:03:54,030 --> 00:03:56,820 Well, you know, when you are in that kind of a cold weather,

101 00:03:56,820 --> 00:03:59,130 and you're not properly dressed, your nose

102 00:03:59,130 --> 00:04:02,280 is running constantly.

103 00:04:02,280 --> 00:04:06,830 So at one time, they were probably,

104 00:04:06,830 --> 00:04:09,390 make you feel miserable or whatever,

105 00:04:09,390 --> 00:04:15,360 out of that prayer shawl, they made shawls, which

106 00:04:15,360 --> 00:04:18,029 I started to tell you earlier.

107 00:04:18,029 --> 00:04:20,820 Somehow, when is throwing out those shawls,

108 00:04:20,820 --> 00:04:24,900 I must have caught two, maybe they were somehow intertwined.

109 00:04:24,900 --> 00:04:28,090 So one I put on, and the other one I tore to pieces.

110 00:04:28,090 --> 00:04:30,180 And this Uncle Fred and Uncle Brett,

111 00:04:30,180 --> 00:04:34,590 of course I gave them a piece of that material, so they

112 00:04:34,590 --> 00:04:37,930 could wipe their nose, just like I could wipe my.

113 00:04:37,930 --> 00:04:40,860 But Uncle Fred, who was living in Munnsvile,

114 00:04:40,860 --> 00:04:43,080 Upstate New York after--

115 00:04:43,080 --> 00:04:43,680 The war.

116 00:04:43,680 --> 00:04:46,260 --the German.

117 00:04:46,260 --> 00:04:48,690 He always said in his Czech language,

118 00:04:48,690 --> 00:04:50,700 I will never forget it.

119 00:04:50,700 --> 00:04:55,970 If I remember when you gave us that piece, of course, to wipe. 00:04:55,970 --> 00:04:58,410 And that was here, not there.

121

00:04:58,410 --> 00:04:59,380 He never forgot that.

122

00:04:59,380 --> 00:05:01,170 And he was treating John.

123

00:05:01,170 --> 00:05:05,850 John went at that time to Colgate University,

124

00:05:05,850 --> 00:05:07,830 undergraduate school.

125

00:05:07,830 --> 00:05:11,970 And we used to get up there to visit Uncle Fred,

126

00:05:11,970 --> 00:05:15,830 with his wife, and John was there.

127

00:05:15,830 --> 00:05:18,900 It was not so far from here, anyhow.

128

00:05:18,900 --> 00:05:21,710 It was far, but not that far, that you could not make it,

129

00:05:21,710 --> 00:05:22,210 you know.

130

00:05:22,210 --> 00:05:25,090 So we saw them occasionally.

131

00:05:25,090 --> 00:05:28,330 But all these people were older than we both were, 00:05:28,330 --> 00:05:31,230 so naturally, we are just by ourselves.

133

00:05:31,230 --> 00:05:36,070 You know my age, Georgine's not that's far behind, you know?

134

00:05:36,070 --> 00:05:40,900 So Uncle, they were born 1904, 1910.

135

00:05:40,900 --> 00:05:42,790 Can we have a break?

136

00:05:42,790 --> 00:05:43,740 Yes, hang on a second.

137

00:05:43,740 --> 00:05:44,170 What happened?

138

00:05:44,170 --> 00:05:44,430 Sorry?

139

00:05:44,430 --> 00:05:46,170 Yeah, I'm sorry, I have to have a break.

140

00:05:46,170 --> 00:05:49,750 I put the new card, but it's not reading, so.

141

00:05:49,750 --> 00:05:50,440 From when.

142

00:05:50,440 --> 00:05:51,940 From now.

143

00:05:51,940 --> 00:05:52,570

OK.

144

00:05:52,570 --> 00:05:53,950

We are fine, but--

145

00:05:53,950 --> 00:05:54,820 yes.

146

00:05:54,820 --> 00:06:01,600 OK, so we were talking about when

147

00:06:01,600 --> 00:06:06,555 you were in Auschwitz, and how you gave your uncles--

148

00:06:06,555 --> 00:06:07,805 that is, Georgine's husbands--

149

00:06:07,805 --> 00:06:09,220 A piece of underwear.

150

00:06:09,220 --> 00:06:11,860 A piece of what had been a prayer shawl, so that they

151

00:06:11,860 --> 00:06:12,900 could wipe, you know--

152

00:06:12,900 --> 00:06:13,400 Nose.

153

00:06:13,400 --> 00:06:16,710 They could wipe his noses.

154

00:06:16,710 --> 00:06:18,960 I wanted to go back a little bit further,

155

00:06:18,960 --> 00:06:20,910 even before you're deported.

156

00:06:20,910 --> 00:06:24,700 Because from what

I understand now,

157 00:06:24,700 --> 00:06:28,520 you lived, really, several years under Nazi rule in Prague.

158 00:06:28,520 --> 00:06:29,410 Oh, sure, sure.

159 00:06:29,410 --> 00:06:31,360 From '38--

160 00:06:31,360 --> 00:06:32,825 '39 to '42.

161 00:06:32,825 --> 00:06:33,400 To '42.

162 00:06:33,400 --> 00:06:33,910 Three years.

163 00:06:33,910 --> 00:06:34,040

164 00:06:34,040 --> 00:06:34,540 Yeah.

165 00:06:34,540 --> 00:06:35,410 Yes.

166 00:06:35,410 --> 00:06:43,460 So during that time, what did you

167 00:06:43,460 --> 00:06:47,180 hear about Reinhard Heydrich, who was the leader,

168 00:06:47,180 --> 00:06:49,438 I mean, who was Hitler's man in Prague. 00:06:49,438 --> 00:06:50,480 What did you know of him?

170

00:06:50,480 --> 00:06:54,050 Well, of course I remember the name Heydrich, of course.

171

00:06:54,050 --> 00:06:58,100 Well, one experience comes right to your mind.

172

00:06:58,100 --> 00:07:00,920 When he was killed, and they were looking around

173

00:07:00,920 --> 00:07:05,060 for those partisans, they used to call them,

174

00:07:05,060 --> 00:07:08,760 who they suspected killed him, well, we

175

00:07:08,760 --> 00:07:11,810 were living in an apartment, we were married, of course.

176

00:07:11,810 --> 00:07:13,730 And we were living in an apartment which

177

00:07:13,730 --> 00:07:17,390 was assigned to us, because the parents had to move out

178

00:07:17,390 --> 00:07:19,370 of the house where they lived.

179

00:07:19,370 --> 00:07:21,920 And they were assigned to another Jewish family, which

180

 $00:07:21,920 \longrightarrow 00:07:24,920$

was, as long as you remember Prague a little bit,

181 00:07:24,920 --> 00:07:26,340 near the Charles Bridge.

182 00:07:26,340 --> 00:07:27,200 Right.

183 00:07:27,200 --> 00:07:29,130 So we were living in that neighborhood,

184 00:07:29,130 --> 00:07:30,960 and I don't know what I was doing.

185 00:07:30,960 --> 00:07:34,760 But most likely working for the Jewish organization.

186 00:07:34,760 --> 00:07:37,230 I shouldn't call it that way, but that's the way it was.

187 00:07:37,230 --> 00:07:39,440 Well, it sounds like an authority, like an authority.

188 00:07:39,440 --> 00:07:41,720 Jewish authority would be a better word.

189 00:07:41,720 --> 00:07:45,980 And I remember the events we were, of course, sleeping,

190 00:07:45,980 --> 00:07:50,315 and all of a sudden, somebody burst into that room.

191 00:07:50,315 --> 00:07:53,510 I don't know if they were soldiers, or SS soldiers,

192 00:07:53,510 --> 00:07:54,440 that I don't remember.

193

00:07:54,440 --> 00:07:57,390 But they were moving the furniture, which was not ours,

194

00:07:57,390 --> 00:07:59,930 was which, we had a furnished room.

195

00:07:59,930 --> 00:08:03,290 They were looking for some hidden escape

196

00:08:03,290 --> 00:08:06,860 routes which these partisans might have taken.

197

00:08:06,860 --> 00:08:08,390 That was the middle of the night.

198

00:08:08,390 --> 00:08:11,060 Whether it was 10:00, 12:00, that I don't remember.

199

00:08:11,060 --> 00:08:14,090 But I remember very well when they came.

200

00:08:14,090 --> 00:08:17,630 Naturally, we were scared to death in bed, sleeping,

201

00:08:17,630 --> 00:08:20,600 and all of a sudden, someone is there with weapons,

202

00:08:20,600 --> 00:08:25,070 moving the furniture to see

whether it's a hidden staircase

203

00:08:25,070 --> 00:08:28,190 to go somewhere where that person might have been hiding.

204

00:08:28,190 --> 00:08:31,110 But ultimately, of course, they didn't find anything.

205

00:08:31,110 --> 00:08:32,490 They left.

206

00:08:32,490 --> 00:08:38,320 But it was very difficult. The conditions became worse.

207

00:08:38,320 --> 00:08:41,950 I don't mean living conditions like eating, no.

208

00:08:41,950 --> 00:08:46,120 It was more the freedom of moving around, yes.

209

00:08:46,120 --> 00:08:49,940 Because you were supposed to have that yellow star.

210

00:08:49,940 --> 00:08:53,020 And if they caught you without wearing it,

211

00:08:53,020 --> 00:08:57,940 without having the documents which a non-Jew had to produce,

212

00:08:57,940 --> 00:08:59,620 it was punishable.

213

00:08:59,620 --> 00:09:03,250 And the office which I was working at 214 00:09:03,250 --> 00:09:06,730 was just across from the headquarter of the Gestapo.

215 00:09:06,730 --> 00:09:11,110 So we have, I have seen many things which normally people

216 00:09:11,110 --> 00:09:12,520 would not have seen, you know.

217 00:09:12,520 --> 00:09:13,210 Such as?

218 00:09:13,210 --> 00:09:17,620 Well, the trucks with the prisoners,

219 00:09:17,620 --> 00:09:20,498 and the mistreating of prisoners getting into the building,

220 00:09:20,498 --> 00:09:21,290 and all that stuff.

221 00:09:21,290 --> 00:09:22,900 It was awful.

222 00:09:22,900 --> 00:09:26,830 That building was originally a bank,

223 00:09:26,830 --> 00:09:30,810 and it was owned by a Jewish person.

224 00:09:30,810 --> 00:09:32,980 The name was called like you have here, Citibank,

225 00:09:32,980 --> 00:09:35,560 so that was called the Pechek Bank.

226

00:09:35,560 --> 00:09:39,130 And he was known, you know, like you know here, Rockefeller,

227

00:09:39,130 --> 00:09:42,580 so he was known, Pechek, the banker, you know.

228

00:09:42,580 --> 00:09:47,680 But what you have seen, yes, every 12:00 a new guard

229

00:09:47,680 --> 00:09:51,160 came to replace the guard from the day before.

230

00:09:51,160 --> 00:09:53,750 So you have seen the power, the might,

231

00:09:53,750 --> 00:09:57,480 what they had at that time.

232

00:09:57,480 --> 00:10:02,050 The streets were that particular location was at,

233

00:10:02,050 --> 00:10:04,650 that had all American Presidents,

234

00:10:04,650 --> 00:10:07,960 it was a Hoover street, it was a Wilson street,

235

00:10:07,960 --> 00:10:09,950 and there were more of them.

236

00:10:09,950 --> 00:10:13,570 So why they had it

there, I don't know.

237

00:10:13,570 --> 00:10:17,045 But that was that bank which they used for the Gestapo,

238

00:10:17,045 --> 00:10:17,545 you know.

239

00:10:17,545 --> 00:10:22,720 The Gestapo headquarters, now, was that parallel to [CZECH]??

240

00:10:22,720 --> 00:10:23,220 Yes.

241

00:10:23,220 --> 00:10:24,262 Then I know the building.

242

00:10:24,262 --> 00:10:24,860 [CZECH]

243

00:10:24,860 --> 00:10:26,570 You are absolutely right.

244

00:10:26,570 --> 00:10:32,572 [CZECH] was this way, and that street was parallel, yes.

245

00:10:32,572 --> 00:10:33,280 Then I know the--

246

00:10:33,280 --> 00:10:34,610 I have passed by the building.

247

00:10:34,610 --> 00:10:35,590 It was parallel.

248

00:10:35,590 --> 00:10:40,840 And that section of Prague had all these American president's 249

00:10:40,840 --> 00:10:43,720 name, probably just to show gratitude

250

00:10:43,720 --> 00:10:47,680 that they made established the Czech Republic

251

00:10:47,680 --> 00:10:50,175 or Czechoslovakia at that time, you know.

252

00:10:50,175 --> 00:10:53,920 But again, the life was--

253

00:10:53,920 --> 00:10:56,110 before the Nazis came--

254

00:10:56,110 --> 00:10:58,780 that was, we had the same freedom like here.

255

00:10:58,780 --> 00:11:04,765 There was no religious discrimination of any kind.

256

00:11:04,765 --> 00:11:07,420 If you were Jewish, you went to a Jewish temple,

257

00:11:07,420 --> 00:11:09,940 if you were Catholic, you went to a Catholic--

258

00:11:09,940 --> 00:11:10,450 Church.

259

00:11:10,450 --> 00:11:12,940 Church, or wherever you went.

260

00:11:12,940 --> 00:11:14,180 That has changed.

261 00:11:14,180 --> 00:11:19,670 People became more, well, maybe afraid,

262

00:11:19,670 --> 00:11:23,200 maybe some of the true feelings also might have come out.

263

00:11:23,200 --> 00:11:23,890 You never know.

264

00:11:23,890 --> 00:11:24,950

265

00:11:24,950 --> 00:11:27,580 Well, going back to Heydrich, when

266

00:11:27,580 --> 00:11:31,240 they burst in into the room in the middle of the night,

267

00:11:31,240 --> 00:11:33,317 did you have any idea why?

268

00:11:33,317 --> 00:11:34,900 Had you heard that Heydrich had been--

269

00:11:34,900 --> 00:11:35,830 Oh yeah, oh yeah.

270

00:11:35,830 --> 00:11:39,630 We knew, oh, sure, how can you not know.

271

00:11:39,630 --> 00:11:46,930 Heydrich was-- you know, we had something called L-A-N-Y, Lany.

272

00:11:46,930 --> 00:11:51,645

Lany was like we have here in the United States, Camp David.

273

00:11:51,645 --> 00:11:52,400 I see.

274

 $00:11:52,400 \longrightarrow 00:11:54,540$ You see, when the

president wants to relax--

275

00:11:54,540 --> 00:11:57,190 whichever president, did not go into politics--

276

00:11:57,190 --> 00:11:59,080 you went to Camp

David, because that

277

00:11:59.080 --> 00:12:03.250 was the summer or the relaxation for the existing president.

278

00:12:03,250 --> 00:12:06,340 So we had that castle Lany.

279

00:12:06,340 --> 00:12:08,890 And Heydrich was

known that he travels

280

 $00:12:08,890 \longrightarrow 00:12:12,400$ between Lany and Prague, because he wanted

281

00:12:12,400 --> 00:12:15,190 to enjoy the same thing, or the president,

282

00:12:15,190 --> 00:12:18,610 enjoy that Lany, the castle which was there.

283

00:12:18,610 --> 00:12:20,780

But somehow those

Partisans which

284

00:12:20,780 --> 00:12:24,810 were dropped by the British, they found out his route,

285

00:12:24,810 --> 00:12:27,460 and eventually, naturally, killed him by--

286

00:12:27,460 --> 00:12:30,010 I don't exactly remember anymore.

287

00:12:30,010 --> 00:12:35,260 The car was passing and somehow exploded or whatever.

288

00:12:35,260 --> 00:12:37,450 But it was big repercussions here,

289

00:12:37,450 --> 00:12:41,890 because he was really the right hand of Hitler.

290

00:12:41,890 --> 00:12:44,350 So when they killed the right hand of Hitler,

291

00:12:44,350 --> 00:12:46,690 you know, they wanted to show.

292

00:12:46,690 --> 00:12:49,300 And you know, they traced it back--

293

00:12:49,300 --> 00:12:51,250 I don't know if you heard that story--

294

00:12:51,250 --> 00:12:54,880 they tried-- they traced it

back that those Partisans were

295

00:12:54,880 --> 00:13:00,550 staying or were dropped off in a town called Lidice.

296

00:13:00,550 --> 00:13:05,860 And out of sympathy, naturally, here in the United States,

297

00:13:05,860 --> 00:13:09,850 in Chicago, there is a suburb called Lidice.

298

00:13:09,850 --> 00:13:12,100 Now I don't know if they have changed it since then

299

00:13:12,100 --> 00:13:12,670 or whatever.

300

00:13:12,670 --> 00:13:16,560 But there is a strong Czech community in Chicago.

301

00:13:16,560 --> 00:13:20,800 And they wanted to show that, somehow, the West stands

302

00:13:20,800 --> 00:13:23,840 with that particular event.

303

00:13:23,840 --> 00:13:25,990 But of course, I remember it.

304

00:13:25,990 --> 00:13:29,770 And there were pictures of Heydrich left and right.

305

00:13:29,770 --> 00:13:33,520 He was the right hand of Hitler, no doubt about it.

306 00:13:33,520 --> 00:13:36,790 Now, when they burst in the middle of the night,

307 00:13:36,790 --> 00:13:39,950 that means it wasn't the same night that Heydrich,

308 00:13:39,950 --> 00:13:42,660 or the same day that Heydrich had been attempted--

309 00:13:42,660 --> 00:13:44,990 No, well, they looking for them, you know.

310 00:13:44,990 --> 00:13:45,660 Right, for days.

311 00:13:45,660 --> 00:13:49,440 And even if they knew that the people are God knows where,

312 00:13:49,440 --> 00:13:51,540 or maybe they were even killed.

313 00:13:51,540 --> 00:13:53,550 They wanted to show the power they had

314 00:13:53,550 --> 00:13:56,580 and to intimidate everybody else.

315 00:13:56,580 --> 00:14:00,720 Were there other reprisals after they captured those, because--

316 00:14:00,720 --> 00:14:03,990 I don't remember exactly what would have happened afterwards, 00:14:03,990 --> 00:14:07,270 except that they took all these men people,

318

00:14:07,270 --> 00:14:10,410 and not only men, boys, from that town of Lidice

319

00:14:10,410 --> 00:14:12,220 and they burned it down.

320

00:14:12,220 --> 00:14:15,300 Females had, I don't know whether they took the females.

321

00:14:15,300 --> 00:14:17,940 But it was awful, awful.

322

00:14:17,940 --> 00:14:22,530 And that kind of event molds the rest of the people, you know.

323

00:14:22,530 --> 00:14:27,900 They say the non-Jews were afraid to talk with Jews,

324

00:14:27,900 --> 00:14:29,790 and the fear was spread all over.

325

00:14:29,790 --> 00:14:33,420 So it's not like the people went against you, no.

326

00:14:33,420 --> 00:14:36,990 I told you, my best friend, he was playing soccer with me.

327

00:14:36,990 --> 00:14:40,650 Who cares whether he was Jewish or Catholic or whatever.

328

00:14:40,650 --> 00:14:43,350

But the fear was there.

329

00:14:43,350 --> 00:14:47,490 So out of fear, there was a certain called segregation.

330

00:14:47,490 --> 00:14:48,750 Yeah.

331

00:14:48,750 --> 00:14:54,250 And it was imposed by the system, you know?

332

00:14:54,250 --> 00:14:58,350 OK, now let's jump to after the war.

333

00:14:58,350 --> 00:15:02,630 When you came back, how did life develop

334

00:15:02,630 --> 00:15:07,310 for you out of your sister in law's apartment?

335

00:15:07,310 --> 00:15:08,990 After that, you get better, it's--

336

00:15:08,990 --> 00:15:12,050 Well, I told you, somehow--

337

00:15:12,050 --> 00:15:15,650 I don't know how I got the apartment, because there were

338

00:15:15,650 --> 00:15:18,590 also Germans who were thrown, not thrown away,

339

00:15:18,590 --> 00:15:23,010 but they made them go back to Germany or wherever.

340

00:15:23,010 --> 00:15:25,630 So I don't know how

I got the apartment.

341

00:15:25,630 --> 00:15:27,260 Certainly didn't pay for it.

342

00:15:27,260 --> 00:15:30,410 I had no money, I was a kid.

343

00:15:30,410 --> 00:15:32,840 Was it allotted to me by someone,

344

00:15:32,840 --> 00:15:34,790 I don't remember that part.

345

00:15:34,790 --> 00:15:40,220 I know I stayed with Georgine until, and then her aunt,

346

00:15:40,220 --> 00:15:43,250 the one they were talking about the clothes,

347

00:15:43,250 --> 00:15:45,350 she came to visit us when she was

348

00:15:45,350 --> 00:15:51,230 expecting George, the one who is a doctor near Washington DC.

349

00:15:51,230 --> 00:15:53,030 She was expecting him, and that was

350

00:15:53,030 --> 00:15:54,710 the first time she came to Prague,

00:15:54,710 --> 00:15:58,010 and the first time we met her, so to speak.

352

00:15:58,010 --> 00:16:00,620 Also, excuse me, we haven't talked about how did Georgine

353

00:16:00,620 --> 00:16:01,932 come back?

354

00:16:01,932 --> 00:16:05,180 Well, Georgine, I don't know how she came back physically,

355

00:16:05,180 --> 00:16:07,940 but I think, which I mentioned to you,

356

00:16:07,940 --> 00:16:09,830 the French were trying desperately

357

00:16:09,830 --> 00:16:11,980 to put people together.

358

00:16:11,980 --> 00:16:16,700 Now, if you think who paid for it, definitely nobody.

359

00:16:16,700 --> 00:16:21,350 That was the government somehow obligation or whatever.

360

00:16:21,350 --> 00:16:23,540 Georgine was sick.

361

00:16:23,540 --> 00:16:28,250 And I remember very distinctly when she came,

362

00:16:28,250 --> 00:16:31,250 there were two of her,

quote, "best friends"

363

00:16:31,250 --> 00:16:34,400 who really made her survive.

364

00:16:34,400 --> 00:16:36,740 Did I remember the name?

365

00:16:36,740 --> 00:16:38,660 I don't know, something Ruth, but they

366

00:16:38,660 --> 00:16:40,750 called her Czech, Ruthka.

367

00:16:40,750 --> 00:16:43,280 And I forgot the second one.

368

00:16:43,280 --> 00:16:45,650 But they were not from Prague, so they

369

00:16:45,650 --> 00:16:47,480 stayed in Prague for a couple of days

370

00:16:47,480 --> 00:16:50,410 before they got a connection to wherever they going.

371

00:16:50,410 --> 00:16:53,420 One was from Moravia, which was the other state

372

00:16:53,420 --> 00:16:55,580 of Czechoslovakia.

373

00:16:55,580 --> 00:16:58,220 And I think they lost, you know, like always, you

374

00:16:58,220 --> 00:17:00,920

lost track of each other, because people

375

00:17:00,920 --> 00:17:02,250 have different interests.

376

00:17:02,250 --> 00:17:07,099 And Georgine, she

needed surgeries.

377

00:17:07,099 --> 00:17:10,170 She developed a

thyroid condition.

378

00:17:10,170 --> 00:17:14,960 The thyroid is not only that it takes away your breathing,

379

00:17:14,960 --> 00:17:21,829 but also she developed a chunk on this side, that would be

380

00:17:21,829 --> 00:17:24,680 her left side, I think it was.

381

00:17:24,680 --> 00:17:27,319 So she had to have that taken out.

382

00:17:27,319 --> 00:17:29,870 It was not taken out

in Czechoslovakia,

383

00:17:29,870 --> 00:17:32,090 but she was treated for it.

384

00:17:32,090 --> 00:17:34,530 As always the truth, it was thinking

385

00:17:34,530 --> 00:17:38,510 and then we came here in New York City.

386 00:17:38,510 --> 00:17:45,140 Not in a hospital, there used to be small practices.

387

00:17:45,140 --> 00:17:47,390 There was one on Park Avenue--

388

00:17:47,390 --> 00:17:50,740 don't hold me to it, but I remember it was on 83rd Street,

389

00:17:50,740 --> 00:17:55,510 I think, between Park and Madison, closer to Park.

390

00:17:55,510 --> 00:17:59,420 And it had to be taken out, because the doctor said here

391

00:17:59,420 --> 00:18:02,480 that she would have difficulties.

392

00:18:02,480 --> 00:18:08,930 Now come to think of it, why was it not done in Australia?

393

00:18:08,930 --> 00:18:10,880 She had it in Australia.

394

00:18:10,880 --> 00:18:14,320 But you know, Australia of 19--

395

00:18:14,320 --> 00:18:17,030 when we got there, 1949--

396

00:18:17,030 --> 00:18:20,618 was a different Australia than 2013.

397

00:18:20,618 --> 00:18:21,160

That's right.

398

00:18:21,160 --> 00:18:23,790 They were very backwards.

399

00:18:23,790 --> 00:18:27,260 Not because they were dumb or something, it was the location.

400

00:18:27,260 --> 00:18:29,090 They were so far away from anything.

401

00:18:29,090 --> 00:18:30,500

402

00:18:30,500 --> 00:18:31,450 That's right.

403

00:18:31,450 --> 00:18:34,550 It was a different Australia.

404

00:18:34,550 --> 00:18:37,190 That's why we also changed the name, because when

405

00:18:37,190 --> 00:18:41,120 I said my name is Pekarek, it was like talking to God

406

00:18:41,120 --> 00:18:42,450 knows what.

407

00:18:42,450 --> 00:18:49,140 So it was very difficult. Then since she was here,

408

00:18:49,140 --> 00:18:54,570 she read, heard that the treatment here

409

00:18:54,570 --> 00:18:59,630

is much more progressive with nuclear energy.

410

00:18:59,630 --> 00:19:02,230 I want to go back to when she comes back to Prague.

411

00:19:02,230 --> 00:19:03,180 Yeah, please.

412

00:19:03,180 --> 00:19:04,130 Yeah.

413

00:19:04,130 --> 00:19:05,510 She's sick.

414

00:19:05,510 --> 00:19:06,800 Did you meet her--

415

00:19:06,800 --> 00:19:10,312 did she return back to your her sister's apartment as well,

416

00:19:10,312 --> 00:19:11,520 and that's where you met her?

417

00:19:11,520 --> 00:19:13,430 Yeah, we had the apartment, which I told you

418

00:19:13,430 --> 00:19:15,500 I got in central Prague.

419

00:19:15,500 --> 00:19:18,460 I know, but your first meeting when she comes back,

420

00:19:18,460 --> 00:19:20,300 do you remember it?

421

00:19:20,300 --> 00:19:22,610 Well, I don't think I remember

exactly the first couple

422

00:19:22,610 --> 00:19:23,580 of days, not really.

423

00:19:23,580 --> 00:19:27,400 No, so you, all right.

424

00:19:27,400 --> 00:19:30,030 But when she does come back, she's very sick,

425

00:19:30,030 --> 00:19:31,400 and so she needs treatment.

426

00:19:31,400 --> 00:19:32,030 Yes.

427

00:19:32,030 --> 00:19:36,110 And had you had your apartment that you were assigned already

428

00:19:36,110 --> 00:19:37,130 by that time?

429

00:19:37,130 --> 00:19:37,760 Oh yes, yes.

430

00:19:37,760 --> 00:19:38,660 I see, OK.

431

00:19:38,660 --> 00:19:39,920 I had the apartment.

432

00:19:39,920 --> 00:19:44,060 You know, I was, I told you I was in Prague April 20, when

433

00:19:44,060 --> 00:19:46,910 the Germans was still there celebrating Hitler.

434

00:19:46,910 --> 00:19:52,730 So when the revolution finished at May 9th,

435

00:19:52,730 --> 00:19:55,992 I somehow, couple days later, I got the apartment.

436

00:19:55,992 --> 00:19:56,700 I don't know how.

437

00:19:56,700 --> 00:19:57,980 Oh, so it's within a few days.

438

00:19:57,980 --> 00:19:59,210 But she wasn't there yet.

439

00:19:59,210 --> 00:20:03,620 No, she came much later, because she was on the Russian side,

440

00:20:03,620 --> 00:20:06,770 and they were not so organized bringing the people back,

441

00:20:06,770 --> 00:20:09,290 like when you were somewhere on the Western side.

442

00:20:09,290 --> 00:20:09,830 Got it.

443

00:20:09,830 --> 00:20:11,720 So eventually, she did come back.

444

00:20:11,720 --> 00:20:13,250 Now how did she find me?

445

00:20:13,250 --> 00:20:16,250

Well, most likely through her sister.

446 00:20:16,250 --> 00:20:19,340 That's my guessing now 70 years later.

447

00:20:19,340 --> 00:20:19,840 OK.

448

00:20:19,840 --> 00:20:22,370 Do I remember exactly how she found me, no.

449

00:20:22,370 --> 00:20:24,570 And did you start working again?

450

00:20:24,570 --> 00:20:25,070 Yes.

451

00:20:25,070 --> 00:20:25,290 What were you doing?

452

00:20:25,290 --> 00:20:27,230 The same firm where I used to work before.

453

00:20:27,230 --> 00:20:28,010 OK.

454 00:20:28,010 --> 00:20:31,340 They claim-- there's a story to it also.

455

00:20:31,340 --> 00:20:34,370 They got it back, because naturally, it was theirs.

456

00:20:34,370 --> 00:20:38,750 And even if we had a left-leaning government,

457

00:20:38,750 --> 00:20:41,480 it was theirs, they got it back.

458 00:20:41,480 --> 00:20:44,670 And since they were quite well-off,

459 00:20:44,670 --> 00:20:49,700 and they had connections to the United States, how.

460 00:20:49,700 --> 00:20:53,240 The original owner who was a very old man,

461 00:20:53,240 --> 00:20:54,680 he had quite a few children.

462 00:20:54,680 --> 00:20:57,320 In those days, you know, there not so many precautions not

463 00:20:57,320 --> 00:21:00,470 to get children, or pregnant, or whatever.

464 00:21:00,470 --> 00:21:03,420 So he had, I think, five or six of them.

465 00:21:03,420 --> 00:21:07,310 And two were living here in the United States

466 00:21:07,310 --> 00:21:10,320 married before the war started.

467 00:21:10,320 --> 00:21:12,870 One was in Philadelphia, and I don't know

468 00:21:12,870 --> 00:21:15,800 where the other one was living. 00:21:15,800 --> 00:21:19,720 So they got the thing back, but because it

470

00:21:19,720 --> 00:21:24,460 was so left-leaning, the whole Czechoslovakia after World War

471

00:21:24,460 --> 00:21:29,050 II, because the Soviet Union, we were your protectors,

472

00:21:29,050 --> 00:21:32,710 and the country was really very much

473

00:21:32,710 --> 00:21:36,910 to the left, which we didn't care for.

474

00:21:36,910 --> 00:21:41,290 So this firm had difficulties with the labor force,

475

00:21:41,290 --> 00:21:46,880 because they were delivering coal, C-O-A-L, you know, coal.

476

00:21:46,880 --> 00:21:47,660 Yeah.

477

00:21:47,660 --> 00:21:49,930 You know, don't forget, nowadays you have gas,

478

00:21:49,930 --> 00:21:51,410 you have all kinds of things.

479

00:21:51,410 --> 00:21:54,280 But in Prague, coal was the thing

480

00:21:54,280 --> 00:21:56,800

to make your morning coffee.

481 00:21:56,800 --> 00:21:59,040 So it was very--

482 00:21:59,040 --> 00:22:02,410 and horses were the ones which really held the coal.

483 00:22:02,410 --> 00:22:04,120 Ah, so now I understand.

484 00:22:04,120 --> 00:22:06,940 You worked as an accountant for a coal company.

485 00:22:06,940 --> 00:22:07,820 That's correct.

486 00:22:07,820 --> 00:22:08,320 I see.

487 00:22:08,320 --> 00:22:09,740 I thought it was an accounting company.

488 00:22:09,740 --> 00:22:10,240 No, no, no.

489 00:22:10,240 --> 00:22:11,470 No, it was a coal company.

490 00:22:11,470 --> 00:22:12,750 I was the accountant for--

491 00:22:12,750 --> 00:22:13,333 For the coal--

492 00:22:13,333 --> 00:22:15,240 A company which was selling coal. 493 00:22:15,240 --> 00:22:15,850 OK.

494

00:22:15,850 --> 00:22:19,170 And the owner was an old man, he had several sons.

495

00:22:19,170 --> 00:22:22,150 But two of them worked in the firm.

496 00:22:22,150 --> 00:22:24,660 And it was a very successful firm.

497 00:22:24,660 --> 00:22:29,830 OK, so now when they come back, they reclaim their firm.

498 00:22:29,830 --> 00:22:31,160 Do they eventually leave it?

499 00:22:31,160 --> 00:22:32,890 Because you're talking about this left-leaning government.

500 00:22:32,890 --> 00:22:34,670 Yes, that's what I wanted to tell you.

501 00:22:34,670 --> 00:22:35,800 So tell me.

502 00:22:35,800 --> 00:22:40,600 So then this more left-wing it's more left-wingish.

503 00:22:40,600 --> 00:22:43,720 So eventually, I don't remember if it was nationalized

504 00:22:43,720 --> 00:22:45,790 or not, those things escape me.

505 00:22:45,790 --> 00:22:49,720 But Henik, he was one of the sons, he wanted to get out,

506 00:22:49,720 --> 00:22:51,970 but there was nowhere to go.

507 00:22:51,970 --> 00:22:54,940 To get a visa permit here was very difficult,

508 00:22:54,940 --> 00:22:58,360 and the two relatives of his, well, you know,

509 00:22:58,360 --> 00:23:00,850 it's very difficult to make a living here.

510 00:23:00,850 --> 00:23:03,460 Thinking about millions which they had over there,

511 00:23:03,460 --> 00:23:05,890 they didn't have the millions here.

512 00:23:05,890 --> 00:23:07,630 So he had difficulties coming.

513 00:23:07,630 --> 00:23:12,190 But I promised him when I went to Australia

514 00:23:12,190 --> 00:23:15,970 that I would try to see if I could get him some documents

515 00:23:15,970 --> 00:23:18,820 to get to Australia. 516 00:23:18,820 --> 00:23:21,820 Believe it or not, I did manage to help him.

517 00:23:21,820 --> 00:23:24,010 And he came to Australia eventually

518 00:23:24,010 --> 00:23:28,390 with his wife, two children, and he was

519 00:23:28,390 --> 00:23:32,290 driving a cab, of all things.

520 00:23:32,290 --> 00:23:35,480 Quite successful, but naturally, money-wise, no comparison

521 00:23:35,480 --> 00:23:37,427 to what he had been.

522 00:23:37,427 --> 00:23:39,010 But I'm pretty sure they must have had

523 00:23:39,010 --> 00:23:40,630 some money here or something.

524 00:23:40,630 --> 00:23:45,140 OK, so let's go back to left-leaning government

525 00:23:45,140 --> 00:23:45,940 in Prague.

526 00:23:45,940 --> 00:23:49,120 The owners are not happy, they don't want to stay.

527 00:23:49,120 --> 00:23:50,455 What makes you not happy? 528 00:23:50,455 --> 00:23:51,205 What specifically?

529 00:23:51,205 --> 00:23:53,230 The Left-wingish thing.

530 00:23:53,230 --> 00:23:56,230 Look, for example, there were elections.

531 00:23:56,230 --> 00:23:59,170 You had to go with everybody in that firm,

532 00:23:59,170 --> 00:24:01,900 and to sing the name of the leader.

533 00:24:01,900 --> 00:24:02,725 Who was--

534 00:24:02,725 --> 00:24:05,770 His name was Gottwald, and he was

535 00:24:05,770 --> 00:24:07,690 the only one who was running.

536 00:24:07,690 --> 00:24:12,070 So having that experience from World War II,

537 00:24:12,070 --> 00:24:16,030 we have seen that the country is deteriorating.

538 00:24:16,030 --> 00:24:23,920 So it was between '40 and '48, I was always under the impression

539 00:24:23,920 --> 00:24:27,470 that it was still not a Communist country.

540

00:24:27,470 --> 00:24:29,740 No, but it was very

left-wingish, yes.

541

 $00:24:29,740 \longrightarrow 00:24:30,510$

I see.

542

 $00:24:30,510 \longrightarrow 00:24:31,270$

I see

543

00:24:31,270 --> 00:24:32,690

And I would say not between '40.

544

00:24:32,690 --> 00:24:34,400

Between 1945 when we came back.

545

00:24:34,400 --> 00:24:35,990

45, yes, that's right.

546

00:24:35,990 --> 00:24:38,260

To 1948, definitely.

547

00:24:38,260 --> 00:24:39,900

Only one candidate.

548

00:24:39,900 --> 00:24:41,130

OK.

549

 $00:24:41,130 \longrightarrow 00:24:43,675$

If you liked it or not,

he was the only one.

550

 $00:24:43,675 \longrightarrow 00:24:46,450$

And naturally, he was

a Communist leader.

551

00:24:46,450 --> 00:24:49,570

So it was, it was

not 100% Communistic,

552 00:24:49,570 --> 00:24:50,970 but it was getting there.

553 00:24:50,970 --> 00:24:52,360 OK, so here's the other question.

554 00:24:52,360 --> 00:24:56,680 You say that when the Nazis came in, because of their policies,

555 00:24:56,680 --> 00:25:00,400 it affected the relationships people had with each other.

556 00:25:00,400 --> 00:25:01,420 So that if you were--

557 00:25:01,420 --> 00:25:01,920 Yes.

558 00:25:01,920 --> 00:25:04,720 --had a-- who was non-Jew, a friend who was non-Jewish,

559 00:25:04,720 --> 00:25:07,300 it became, you became estranged even

560 00:25:07,300 --> 00:25:08,850 through no desire of your own.

561 00:25:08,850 --> 00:25:10,308 Religion had nothing to do with it.

562 00:25:10,308 --> 00:25:11,740 If you were not one of--

563 00:25:11,740 --> 00:25:14,200 for example, look, your kid could go to school,

564

00:25:14,200 --> 00:25:17,300 to a college, if he was from a bourgeois,

565

00:25:17,300 --> 00:25:18,550 they call it bourgeois family.

566

00:25:18,550 --> 00:25:19,925 That's what I wanted to find out.

567

00:25:19,925 --> 00:25:21,160 How did that develop--

568

00:25:21,160 --> 00:25:21,910 That's how it was.

569

00:25:21,910 --> 00:25:22,801 Now, after the war.

570

00:25:22,801 --> 00:25:23,301 Tell us.

571

00:25:23,301 --> 00:25:26,740 So when your child was born from a bourgeois family,

572

00:25:26,740 --> 00:25:28,750 that child couldn't go to college.

573

00:25:28,750 --> 00:25:31,030 Well, what was your family considered?

574

00:25:31,030 --> 00:25:32,950 Well, I had no children to begin with,

575

00:25:32,950 --> 00:25:35,110

but there was no family left, you know.

576 00:25:35,110 --> 00:25:37,630 So I didn't have that kind of a problem.

577 00:25:37,630 --> 00:25:40,400 But you didn't like it.

578 00:25:40,400 --> 00:25:41,150 OK.

579 00:25:41,150 --> 00:25:44,740 It smelled too much from controlled leftists.

580 00:25:44,740 --> 00:25:49,120 So Nazi, Hitler was to control from the right side.

581 00:25:49,120 --> 00:25:52,780 This was the same garbage on the left side.

582 00:25:52,780 --> 00:25:55,030 There's one question I forgot to ask you before.

583 00:25:55,030 --> 00:25:55,810 Please.

584 00:25:55,810 --> 00:26:00,082 When did you find out what happened to your parents?

585 00:26:00,082 --> 00:26:01,290 Well, that's a good question.

586 00:26:01,290 --> 00:26:04,070 I think my sister survived, and I 587 00:26:04,070 --> 00:26:07,070 think she said she gave me the date when

588 00:26:07,070 --> 00:26:12,000 they were in so to speak, transported from one camp

589 00:26:12,000 --> 00:26:13,040 to Auschwitz.

590 00:26:13,040 --> 00:26:14,480 So from Theresienstadt.

591 00:26:14,480 --> 00:26:15,710 Yes.

592 00:26:15,710 --> 00:26:18,050 And once they got to Auschwitz, there

593 00:26:18,050 --> 00:26:20,480 was no way that they could have survived.

594 00:26:20,480 --> 00:26:22,736 Because my father would have been old,

595 00:26:22,736 --> 00:26:24,950 also a little bit on the sick side,

596 00:26:24,950 --> 00:26:29,110 had difficulties with not arthritis,

597 00:26:29,110 --> 00:26:31,760 they were calling it something else.

598 00:26:31,760 --> 00:26:33,890

Had difficulties walking, I don't remember

599

00:26:33,890 --> 00:26:36,170 the name what they used it for.

600

00:26:36,170 --> 00:26:38,210 But they were old people, you know.

601

00:26:38,210 --> 00:26:40,880 Now, my father was born '78.

602

00:26:40,880 --> 00:26:45,470 So when he got to Auschwitz, say 1944, 1945,

603

00:26:45,470 --> 00:26:47,180 so he was close to 70.

604

00:26:47,180 --> 00:26:49,900 Well, I'm now 90, but that was a different time.

605

00:26:49,900 --> 00:26:50,970 Yeah, he was 64, 65.

606

00:26:50,970 --> 00:26:52,640 And you see, here you are a free person,

607

00:26:52,640 --> 00:26:56,440 whether you live until 90 or 105.

608

00:26:56,440 --> 00:26:57,170 You know.

609

00:26:57,170 --> 00:27:00,560 But that was a controlled society.

610

00:27:00,560 --> 00:27:01,850 Jewish on top of it.

611 00:27:01,850 --> 00:27:05,380 So when they got there, they had no chance.

612 00:27:05,380 --> 00:27:06,320 They had no chance.

613 00:27:06,320 --> 00:27:09,402 So my sister knew the day, and she told me.

614 00:27:09,402 --> 00:27:10,610 I forgot the date, of course.

615 00:27:10,610 --> 00:27:12,620 But she told me when the day came,

616 00:27:12,620 --> 00:27:15,713 she couldn't hold them as a dependent anymore.

617 00:27:15,713 --> 00:27:17,505 And she was there-and they were deported.

618 00:27:17,505 --> 00:27:19,830 I see, I see.

619 00:27:19,830 --> 00:27:21,560 And once they were deported to Auschwitz,

620 00:27:21,560 --> 00:27:25,460 well, that was, of course, the end, you know.

621 00:27:25,460 --> 00:27:28,580 So, OK, let's go back to after the war. 622 00:27:28,580 --> 00:27:31,460 So you didn't you didn't like the way

623 00:27:31,460 --> 00:27:32,640 you saw things developing.

624 00:27:32,640 --> 00:27:33,140 Exactly.

625 00:27:33,140 --> 00:27:33,900 Back in Prague.

626 00:27:33,900 --> 00:27:34,820 That was the truth.

627 00:27:34,820 --> 00:27:36,680 Yeah.

628 00:27:36,680 --> 00:27:39,650 What did you-- what actions did you start taking?

629 00:27:39,650 --> 00:27:41,580 How did things develop from thought to action.

630 00:27:41,580 --> 00:27:42,500 You see that, I couldn't take--

631 00:27:42,500 --> 00:27:44,750 I didn't take any action, except that I wanted

632 00:27:44,750 --> 00:27:46,850 to get out with Georgine.

633 00:27:46,850 --> 00:27:50,180 And being of that age, military age. 634

00:27:50,180 --> 00:27:53,960 Now, for example, when I came back, I had to join the army.

635

00:27:53,960 --> 00:27:57,390 Not that I wanted, there was a compulsory--

636

00:27:57,390 --> 00:27:57,980 Right.

637

00:27:57,980 --> 00:28:00,830 So for I don't remember how many months,

638

00:28:00,830 --> 00:28:04,160 I was within the army, office, but still I

639

00:28:04,160 --> 00:28:06,200 was in the armed forces.

640

00:28:06,200 --> 00:28:08,390 And then they passed a law that people

641

00:28:08,390 --> 00:28:12,870 who were in a concentration camp were exempt from that service.

642

00:28:12,870 --> 00:28:14,960 So I came back to the apartment, which

643

00:28:14,960 --> 00:28:17,480 I had originally with Georgine.

644

00:28:17,480 --> 00:28:19,220 So Georgine came to visit me.

645

00:28:19,220 --> 00:28:20,600 How she got there, I don't know. 646 00:28:20,600 --> 00:28:24,100 Most likely by bus, because we didn't have a car.

647 00:28:24,100 --> 00:28:27,050 Having a car was a luxury in those days.

648 00:28:27,050 --> 00:28:30,740 So she must have come by bus to visit me.

649 00:28:30,740 --> 00:28:32,923 And naturally there was a question of money,

650 00:28:32,923 --> 00:28:34,465 because when you are in the military,

651 00:28:34,465 --> 00:28:36,260 you don't make-what do you make?

652 00:28:36,260 --> 00:28:37,220 Nothing.

653 00:28:37,220 --> 00:28:38,900 So there were some difficulties.

654 00:28:38,900 --> 00:28:40,850 Do I remember what difficulties?

655 00:28:40,850 --> 00:28:41,930 Not really.

656 00:28:41,930 --> 00:28:44,370 Somehow we made it.

657 00:28:44,370 --> 00:28:48,400 You know, maybe some money was leftover from the father,

658 00:28:48,400 --> 00:28:49,810 her father.

659 00:28:49,810 --> 00:28:52,520 But you know, that during that kind of a situation,

660 00:28:52,520 --> 00:28:54,180 that's happening here to somebody--

661 00:28:54,180 --> 00:28:56,500 I'm not going to touch that base.

662 00:28:56,500 --> 00:29:00,170 But when people-my father-in-law--

663 00:29:00,170 --> 00:29:04,210 then when they heard that this one was transported

664 00:29:04,210 --> 00:29:06,500 to some camp and this one.

665 00:29:06,500 --> 00:29:09,010 So as a precaution, they gave, they

666 00:29:09,010 --> 00:29:11,980 had a housekeeper of the house, which was living

667 00:29:11,980 --> 00:29:14,390 in the basement, so to speak.

668 00:29:14,390 --> 00:29:15,850 So they gave her some money.

669

00:29:15,850 --> 00:29:16,660 How much?

670

00:29:16,660 --> 00:29:18,220 No idea.

671

00:29:18,220 --> 00:29:21,420 He had a factory.

672

00:29:21,420 --> 00:29:24,760 Remember, the time goes back now, 60, 70 years.

673

00:29:24,760 --> 00:29:27,650 So plastic was a novelty.

674

00:29:27,650 --> 00:29:33,400 So in Czechoslovakia, when you bought a drink,

675

00:29:33,400 --> 00:29:34,800 let's say like a Coke.

676

00:29:34,800 --> 00:29:37,270 Was not a Coke, like a Coke.

677

00:29:37,270 --> 00:29:40,180 So it has a top which you closed, you know.

678

00:29:40,180 --> 00:29:41,890 But it was the old fashioned thing,

679

00:29:41,890 --> 00:29:46,510 which was very difficult, and maybe not nice-looking.

680

00:29:46,510 --> 00:29:52,771 So he developed, with a partner, plastic--

681

00:30:15,760 --> 00:30:17,650 In that connection, I would like to refer

00:30:17,650 --> 00:30:20,580 to a story which appeared in the Wall Street Journal

00:30:20,580 --> 00:30:22,980 not more than maybe two weeks ago,

690

00:30:22,980 --> 00:30:25,380 and I gave it to Elise to read.

691

00:30:25,380 --> 00:30:26,320

Why?

692

00:30:26,320 --> 00:30:30,210

Because it turned out

that New York State,

693

00:30:30,210 --> 00:30:35,380 there are unclaimed insurance policies,

694

00:30:35,380 --> 00:30:40,060 monies which were left around in banks, in the B--

695

00:30:40,060 --> 00:30:41,800 in the billions.

696

00:30:41,800 --> 00:30:45,370 And this story was that New York State can't get this

697

00:30:45,370 --> 00:30:46,840 if it stays unclaimed.

698

00:30:46,840 --> 00:30:49,000 Because there is a law, if you don't

699

00:30:49,000 --> 00:30:52,420 claim x, after so many years, it becomes

700

00:30:52,420 --> 00:30:54,340 the property of the state.

701

00:30:54,340 --> 00:30:56,260 So naturally New York State, I can't

702

00:30:56,260 --> 00:30:59,020 imagine if they could get a couple of million,

703

00:30:59,020 --> 00:31:02,460 or perhaps billion, oh my gosh, you know.

704 00:31:02,460 --> 00:31:03,100 Yeah.

705 00:31:03,100 --> 00:31:04,720 So that was the story.

706 00:31:04,720 --> 00:31:09,610 And I have no doubt insurance companies, banks--

707 00:31:09,610 --> 00:31:12,050 and I'm telling you out of experience,

708 00:31:12,050 --> 00:31:15,610 Georgine knew that her father had the life insurance policy

709 00:31:15,610 --> 00:31:18,700 with x, I forgot the name.

710 00:31:18,700 --> 00:31:22,840 So when we came here, we tried to get in touch

711 00:31:22,840 --> 00:31:23,680 with those people.

712 00:31:23,680 --> 00:31:26,440 We found some documents showing that he had this,

713 00:31:26,440 --> 00:31:28,390 and he had that, and whatever.

714 00:31:28,390 --> 00:31:31,870 So the answer which we got, if I would look for it,

715 00:31:31,870 --> 00:31:32,860 I would find it. 716 00:31:32,860 --> 00:31:34,480 I'm not going to take the time now,

718 00:31:36,850 --> 00:31:41,200 But they responded that we have to produce a death certificate.

719 00:31:41,200 --> 00:31:43,330 Now, to get a death certificate for somebody

720 00:31:43,330 --> 00:31:48,820 who passed away in Auschwitz, is like, I don't have to tell you.

721 00:31:48,820 --> 00:31:50,390 So nothing happened.

722 00:31:50,390 --> 00:31:55,160 But that means that that policy was never consummated.

723 00:31:55,160 --> 00:31:58,930 So if he was entitled to those benefits, 10,000, 100,000,

724 00:31:58,930 --> 00:32:02,080 whatever, that was never paid.

725 00:32:02,080 --> 00:32:08,230 So really, the unclaimed amounts which are there,

726 00:32:08,230 --> 00:32:09,480 must be in the--

727 00:32:09,480 --> 00:32:11,085 I'm telling you, they story was--

728

00:32:11,085 --> 00:32:13,480 they mentioned, I think, \$2 billion.

729

00:32:13,480 --> 00:32:16,270 Because I'm sure my father-in-law

730

734

00:32:22,480 --> 00:32:24,360 Yeah, in Czechoslovakia, yeah, yeah.

736

00:32:25,240 --> 00:32:28,870 But the money had been somehow, say, inherited by Georgine,

737

00:32:28,870 --> 00:32:30,970 or somehow it would have come.

738

00:32:30,970 --> 00:32:34,090 Or maybe to her sister while she was still living there.

739 00:32:34,090 --> 00:32:36,670 It was never paid, because we could not prove--

740

00:32:36,670 --> 00:32:37,590 His death.

741

00:32:37,590 --> 00:32:38,920 His death.

742

00:32:38,920 --> 00:32:41,320 And I'm sure there were cases, God knows how many,

743

00:32:41,320 --> 00:32:44,260 because lots of people didn't come back.

744

00:32:44,260 --> 00:32:45,450 Especially older people.

745

00:32:45,450 --> 00:32:47,700 You know, the young people might have survived longer,

746

00:32:47,700 --> 00:32:51,200 but the older people had no chance.

747

00:32:51,200 --> 00:32:53,960 So I'm just telling you what happened

748

00:32:53,960 --> 00:32:56,090 in Wall Street Journal, which I enjoy reading,

749

00:32:56,090 --> 00:32:58,320 but that's not the issue.

750

So the situation was--

751 00:33:00,530 --> 00:33:04,700 it was very, it was not the same Czechoslovakia

754 00:33:07,670 --> 00:33:11,060 Wait, were you still there when Jan Masaryk was killed?

755 00:33:11,060 --> 00:33:12,080 Yes, yes, yes.

756 00:33:12,080 --> 00:33:13,710 What can you tell us about that?

757 00:33:13,710 --> 00:33:13,820 Well--

758 00:33:13,820 --> 00:33:15,880 What happened to you-how did you experience it?

759 00:33:15,880 --> 00:33:20,480 Well, we experienced only that somehow he jumped to his death.

760 00:33:20,480 --> 00:33:22,610 That was the official version.

761 00:33:22,610 --> 00:33:25,310 Now, the unofficial version was that they threw him out

762 00:33:25,310 --> 00:33:26,540 of the window. 763 00:33:26,540 --> 00:33:29,630 Now, what was true?

764 00:33:29,630 --> 00:33:31,940 That depends on what side you are on.

765 00:33:31,940 --> 00:33:34,370 Were people frightened to speak to one another?

766 00:33:34,370 --> 00:33:35,615 Oh yes, oh, definitely.

767 00:33:35,615 --> 00:33:37,490 Because you didn't know what the other person

768 00:33:37,490 --> 00:33:41,630 would do to enhance his position, whatever he was,

769 00:33:41,630 --> 00:33:42,650 he or she.

770 00:33:42,650 --> 00:33:43,430 Yes.

771 00:33:43,430 --> 00:33:46,460 It was not the same Czechoslovakia, no.

772 00:33:46,460 --> 00:33:49,220 And that, is in every part of what you're asking me,

773 00:33:49,220 --> 00:33:50,300 why did it.

774 00:33:50,300 --> 00:33:53,478 It was not just the threat from the Soviet Union,

775

00:33:53,478 --> 00:33:55,770 we didn't have anything, so what would they have taken,

776

00:33:55,770 --> 00:33:57,140 and we just came back.

777

00:33:57,140 --> 00:33:58,600 But it was everything.

778

00:33:58,600 --> 00:34:02,750 You know, the distrust of each other, the quality of life

779

00:34:02,750 --> 00:34:07,160 wasn't the same, by far not the same.

780

00:34:07,160 --> 00:34:09,889 Religion, well, religion, we didn't practice any religion

781

00:34:09,889 --> 00:34:12,320 anyhow, so that did make any different.

782

00:34:12,320 --> 00:34:14,750 But the life was not the same, no.

783

00:34:14,750 --> 00:34:17,810 You talk to a neighbor, you were afraid in case

784

00:34:17,810 --> 00:34:21,469 you say something that it might be turned over against you.

785

00:34:21,469 --> 00:34:24,770 If you were more on the liberal side, rather than
