you were talking about watching
war movies and the effect that

9 00:00:25,410 --> 00:00:26,980 Can you talk about that?

10 00:00:26,980 --> 00:00:28,350 Yes.

11 00:00:28,350 --> 00:00:31,740 When I say war movies, I don't mean the Hollywood--

12 00:00:31,740 --> 00:00:35,760 there are 10 American soldiers and 3,000 Germans,

13 00:00:35,760 --> 00:00:36,420 and they win.

14 00:00:36,420 --> 00:00:38,430 I don't mean that sort of Hollywood movie.

15 00:00:38,430 --> 00:00:42,150 I'm talking about the documentaries

16 00:00:42,150 --> 00:00:45,720 and the real movies, something like Schindler's List,

17 00:00:45,720 --> 00:00:50,740 which comes as close to being not Hollywood as can be.

18 00:00:50,740 --> 00:00:52,620 It all upsets me.

19 00:00:52,620 --> 00:00:56,760 Everything, I try to see everything on the war

20 00:00:56,760 --> 00:00:58,710 or read everything about the war.

21 00:00:58,710 --> 00:01:05,040 And I know I'll be very upset, but it's almost like I cannot

22 00:01:05,040 --> 00:01:05,790 stop.

23 00:01:05,790 --> 00:01:08,140 I have to do it.

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24
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00:01:08,140 --> 00:01:09,810 It's a very, very strange feeling.

25

00:01:09,810 --> 00:01:12,970 And then I'm sad for days, but I have to do it.

26

00:01:12,970 --> 00:01:16,050 How do you feel as you watch it?

27

00:01:16,050 --> 00:01:18,660 I relate everything to me, I guess.

00:01:21,510 --> 00:01:24,000 I see someone in a concentration camp.

30

00:01:24,000 --> 00:01:28,910 I think that could very well be my family, I guess.

31

00:01:28,910 --> 00:01:31,890 And I make it personal.

32

00:01:31,890 --> 00:01:37,530 I guess, every war film, I kind of make personal.

33

00:01:37,530 --> 00:01:40,620 And how do you feel after you watch it?

34

00:01:40,620 --> 00:01:42,040 Very, very badly.

00:01:42,040 --> 00:01:46,170

I try to do something

fun, just forget about it,

36 00:01:46,170 --> 00:01:48,660 but you don't forget.

37 00:01:48,660 --> 00:01:51,280 But you continue to be drawn to watch--

38 00:01:51,280 --> 00:01:52,258 Yes, yes.

39 00:01:52,258 --> 00:01:53,550 --movies even though you know--

40 00:01:53,550 --> 00:01:54,450 Even though I know--

41 00:01:54,450 --> 00:01:54,950 --after.

42 00:01:54,950 --> 00:01:55,680 Uh-huh.

43 00:01:55,680 --> 00:01:57,870 It's almost like a drug.

44 00:01:57,870 --> 00:01:58,800 You're drawn to it.

45 00:01:58,800 --> 00:02:00,070 You know you shouldn't.

46 00:02:00,070 --> 00:02:02,070 And my husband keeps telling me, don't watch it.

47 00:02:02,070 --> 00:02:03,270 You will be upset.

48 00:02:03,270 --> 00:02:05,250 And I tell him I have to.

49 00:02:05,250 --> 00:02:10,770 And I don't know that he understands, but I have to,

50 00:02:10,770 --> 00:02:11,360 and I do.

51 00:02:11,360 --> 00:02:16,610

52 00:02:16,610 --> 00:02:19,780 And it's not just movie, anything, written material.

53 00:02:19,780 --> 00:02:22,270 Anything, I feel like I need to know.

54 00:02:22,270 --> 00:02:24,530 So you also read about the war--

55 00:02:24,530 --> 00:02:25,210 Oh, yes.

56 00:02:25,210 --> 00:02:26,918 --and about the concentration camps and--

57 00:02:26,918 --> 00:02:27,720 Yes, yes.

58 00:02:27,720 --> 00:02:31,040 --about other people's experiences?

59 00:02:31,040 --> 00:02:31,580 Yes.

60 00:02:31,580 --> 00:02:33,260 Yes, I do. 61 00:02:33,260 --> 00:02:36,740 I feel like, the more I know--

62 00:02:36,740 --> 00:02:40,640 I guess, I think maybe--

63 00:02:40,640 --> 00:02:42,830 I think it will have a healing effect on me,

64 00:02:42,830 --> 00:02:44,010 but it doesn't really.

65 00:02:44,010 --> 00:02:46,920 But I keep thinking, the more I know, the better I'll feel.

66 00:02:46,920 --> 00:02:47,840 But I don't.

67 00:02:47,840 --> 00:02:50,540 Do you know any other survivors?

68 00:02:50,540 --> 00:02:52,760 Or do you talk to other survivors at all?

69 00:02:52,760 --> 00:02:56,120 Well, my cousin for one in San Antonio.

70 00:02:56,120 --> 00:03:01,250 But she's very difficult to talk to about it

71 00:03:01,250 --> 00:03:04,440 because she lives in the past.

72 00:03:04,440 --> 00:03:09,325 I at least try to make an attempt at being in the future 73 00:03:09,325 --> 00:03:10,430 or now.

74 00:03:10,430 --> 00:03:16,640 She lives in the past, and only her experience counts.

75 00:03:16,640 --> 00:03:19,580 So it's very difficult to talk to her about it.

76 00:03:19,580 --> 00:03:22,400 So you don't feel that you really have rapport with here?

77 00:03:22,400 --> 00:03:25,640 Not in that sense.

78 00:03:25,640 --> 00:03:29,050 In fact, I try to avoid that subject because she just

79 00:03:29,050 --> 00:03:31,100 falls to pieces.

80 00:03:31,100 --> 00:03:32,570 So that just makes it worse.

81 00:03:32,570 --> 00:03:33,350 Yes.

82 00:03:33,350 --> 00:03:35,690 So I can't talk to her.

83 00:03:35,690 --> 00:03:39,180 And in San Antonio, there are not that many survivors.

84 00:03:39,180 --> 00:03:40,310 There are some.

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85
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00:03:40,310 --> 00:03:45,010 There's a group out I'll bet you Once a year I see them

86

00:03:45,010 --> 00:03:50,270 when they have Yom HaShoah where you light the candles in April

87

00:03:50,270 --> 00:03:53,750 for the 6 million Jews, and you have the service.

88

00:03:53,750 --> 00:03:55,130 Once a year, I see them.

89

00:03:55,130 --> 00:03:57,890 They usually have the service at one of the synagogues.

90

00:03:57,890 --> 00:04:00,890 And I light the candle with the other people.

91

00:04:00,890 --> 00:04:04,130 And I would venture a guess that there may be,

92

00:04:04,130 --> 00:04:07,880 in the city of San Antonio, maybe 25 of them left

93

00:04:07,880 --> 00:04:09,430 at the most.

94

00:04:09,430 --> 00:04:10,670 So it's not that many people.

95

00:04:10,670 --> 00:04:15,020 And most of them are of my mother's generation.

96

00:04:15,020 --> 00:04:16,819

So I wouldn't know them well anyway.

97 00:04:16,819 --> 00:04:20,089

98 00:04:20,089 --> 00:04:23,120 So is your family observant?

99 00:04:23,120 --> 00:04:24,420 My family, as in--

100 00:04:24,420 --> 00:04:24,920 Now.

101 00:04:24,920 --> 00:04:25,190 --me and--

102 00:04:25,190 --> 00:04:25,690 Yes.

103 00:04:25,690 --> 00:04:28,100

104 00:04:28,100 --> 00:04:33,140 My husband-- it's not so much observant as traditional.

105 00:04:33,140 --> 00:04:36,330 My husband grew up in an orthodox home.

106 00:04:36,330 --> 00:04:39,780 He got away from it when he went to college.

107 00:04:39,780 --> 00:04:43,040 And, when I came, because we weren't observant,

108 00:04:43,040 --> 00:04:47,010 we ended up in a Reform temple with the Reform.

109 00:04:47,010 --> 00:04:49,310 And I felt I fitted in.

110 00:04:49,310 --> 00:04:51,470 He never felt he did.

111 00:04:51,470 --> 00:04:54,020 My children, so we sort of went the middle

112 00:04:54,020 --> 00:04:58,170 of the road conservative.

113 00:04:58,170 --> 00:05:00,790 My children were very comfortable there.

114 00:05:00,790 --> 00:05:01,920 And they grew up.

115 00:05:01,920 --> 00:05:03,250 My son was bar mitzvahed.

116 00:05:03,250 --> 00:05:06,990 My daughter didn't want to have a bat mitzvah,

117 00:05:06,990 --> 00:05:08,865 but she went to Hebrew school and all that.

118 00:05:08,865 --> 00:05:11,750

119 00:05:11,750 --> 00:05:13,160 And now that they're grown, we're

120 00:05:13,160 --> 00:05:16,250 back at the orthodox, which

## doesn't mean a thing to me

121

00:05:16,250 --> 00:05:18,380 because I am not that--

122

00:05:18,380 --> 00:05:21,140 I'm observant in a sense, only because I know

123

00:05:21,140 --> 00:05:23,030 it's important to my family.

124

00:05:23,030 --> 00:05:26,762 The holidays, once a year, twice a year, I go to the synagogue.

125

00:05:26,762 --> 00:05:28,220 Your family, you mean your husband?

126

00:05:28,220 --> 00:05:31,550 My husband and my children and especially my son.

127

00:05:31,550 --> 00:05:35,030 My son is the one probably that--

128

00:05:35,030 --> 00:05:38,510 my husband does all that because he grew up with it.

129

00:05:38,510 --> 00:05:39,290 It's tradition.

130

00:05:39,290 --> 00:05:41,150 It's what's expected of him.

131

00:05:41,150 --> 00:05:46,130 I do it because of

him because I still--

132

00:05:46,130 --> 00:05:48,680 the symbols don't mean anything to me.

133 00:05:48,680 --> 00:05:51,470 None of it means anything to me because I

134 00:05:51,470 --> 00:05:53,390 didn't grow up with it.

135 00:05:53,390 --> 00:05:56,870 But I wanted my children to have the Jewish education.

136 00:05:56,870 --> 00:06:02,180 And my daughter, I'm sure it means something to her.

137 00:06:02,180 --> 00:06:06,000 But, to my son, it's very, very important, very,

138 00:06:06,000 --> 00:06:08,570 very, very important.

139 00:06:08,570 --> 00:06:12,440 I don't mean he's religious and [INAUDIBLE]..

140 00:06:12,440 --> 00:06:16,310 He may go to the synagogue twice a year, but Jewish symbols,

141 00:06:16,310 --> 00:06:20,840 Jewish way of life, holidays, whatever means a lot to him.

142 00:06:20,840 --> 00:06:24,110 In fact, for the last three years, he's been--

143 00:06:24,110 --> 00:06:25,892 when he's out of school in the summer--

144 00:06:25,892 --> 00:06:27,350 he's still at the university-- he's

145 00:06:27,350 --> 00:06:31,250 been a counselor at Camp Young Judaea

146 00:06:31,250 --> 00:06:35,280 where they really observe the laws and all that.

147 00:06:35,280 --> 00:06:38,800 But we do it.

148 00:06:38,800 --> 00:06:42,440 And, like I said, I do it because of the children.

149 00:06:42,440 --> 00:06:45,080 My husband does it because it's expected of him.

150 00:06:45,080 --> 00:06:48,830 But you wanted your children to have the education?

151 00:06:48,830 --> 00:06:50,390 Absolutely.

152 00:06:50,390 --> 00:06:52,670 Why did you feel so strongly about it?

153 00:06:52,670 --> 00:06:57,780 Because all of this doesn't mean that much to me

154 00:06:57,780 --> 00:07:00,460 because I wasn't exposed to it, but I'm thinking,

155 00:07:00,460 --> 00:07:02,550 well, maybe if I was, it would.

156 00:07:02,550 --> 00:07:05,730 And also it doesn't mean that Judaism

157 00:07:05,730 --> 00:07:08,050 doesn't mean much to me.

158 00:07:08,050 --> 00:07:12,590 It means everything to me because I was Jewish.

159 00:07:12,590 --> 00:07:13,728 I come from Jews.

160 00:07:13,728 --> 00:07:14,895 And that's why they're dead.

161 00:07:14,895 --> 00:07:17,940

162 00:07:17,940 --> 00:07:19,718 And I guess I feel none of the symbols

163 00:07:19,718 --> 00:07:20,760 are going to bring them--

164 00:07:20,760 --> 00:07:22,710 with me, it's like one-track mind.

165 00:07:22,710 --> 00:07:26,850 Everything goes back to the fact that my family is dead.

166 00:07:26,850 --> 00:07:32,040 We suffered along with everybody else that was Jewish.

167 00:07:32,040 --> 00:07:34,110 And lighting a candle on Friday night

168 00:07:34,110 --> 00:07:36,288 is not going to bring them back.

169 00:07:36,288 --> 00:07:37,830 It's not going to do anything for me.

170 00:07:37,830 --> 00:07:40,000 That's why it doesn't mean anything to me.

171 00:07:40,000 --> 00:07:44,235 But I don't want my children to feel that way.

172 00:07:44,235 --> 00:07:46,882 So you think maybe they will have something--

173 00:07:46,882 --> 00:07:47,965 They will have something--

174 00:07:47,965 --> 00:07:48,673 --that you don't.

175 00:07:48,673 --> 00:07:50,680 --that I don't.

176 00:07:50,680 --> 00:07:53,500 They should have the opportunity to have that.

177 00:07:53,500 --> 00:07:55,540 There's no reason for them not to have it 00:07:55,540 --> 00:07:57,790 because I'm bitter about it.

179 00:07:57,790 --> 00:08:00,650 I'm bitter to the point where I feel like, well,

180 00:08:00,650 --> 00:08:03,220 if they weren't Jewish, they would be alive.

181 00:08:03,220 --> 00:08:05,170 So why should I light that candle?

182 00:08:05,170 --> 00:08:08,230 But I do it because of the children.

183 00:08:08,230 --> 00:08:10,120 Is it hard for you to do?

184 00:08:10,120 --> 00:08:11,020 No, no, no, no.

185 00:08:11,020 --> 00:08:12,980 The traditions, some of them are nice.

186 00:08:12,980 --> 00:08:15,070 Some of them I think are ridiculous.

187 00:08:15,070 --> 00:08:18,460 Like, now that we belong to the orthodox synagogue

188 00:08:18,460 --> 00:08:20,140 with the women sitting here, men sitting

189 00:08:20,140 --> 00:08:23,170 here, that's ridiculous, but it doesn't bother me

190 00:08:23,170 --> 00:08:25,090 because I'm not doing it for me.

191 00:08:25,090 --> 00:08:28,000 I'd be happy never to go to the synagogue.

192 00:08:28,000 --> 00:08:30,520 I would be just as happy, but I like the tradition.

193 00:08:30,520 --> 00:08:34,510 I like having the kids come home and family and friends

194 00:08:34,510 --> 00:08:35,590 for dinner, all that.

195 00:08:35,590 --> 00:08:37,960 That part of it, I like.

196 00:08:37,960 --> 00:08:40,570 So it's not hard for me.

197 00:08:40,570 --> 00:08:44,260 But it's like my husband expects me to truly

198 00:08:44,260 --> 00:08:47,860 believe, to truly follow, like if we're in the synagogue--

199 00:08:47,860 --> 00:08:49,630 not that he is that--

200 00:08:49,630 --> 00:08:52,390 he does it-- my husband does things

201 00:08:52,390 --> 00:08:54,310 that are expected of him.

202

00:08:54,310 --> 00:08:56,830 So, when we're at the synagogue, I'm supposed to follow.

203

00:08:56,830 --> 00:08:58,690 I'm supposed to feel something.

204

00:08:58,690 --> 00:09:01,100 Well, I don't.

205

00:09:01,100 --> 00:09:06,380 The only redeeming quality there is is we

206

00:09:06,380 --> 00:09:08,300 have a wonderful rabbi.

207

00:09:08,300 --> 00:09:14,620 Even though he's orthodox, he's very, very flexible, I guess,

208

00:09:14,620 --> 00:09:16,120 for lack of a better word.

209

00:09:16,120 --> 00:09:20,080 And we can really talk about anything and everything.

210

00:09:20,080 --> 00:09:21,670 And he's a wonderful man.

211

00:09:21,670 --> 00:09:26,260 And even the Reform Jews belong to the orthodox

212

00:09:26,260 --> 00:09:28,090 because of the rabbi.

213

00:09:28,090 --> 00:09:32,500

So that part is OK.

214 00:09:32,500 --> 00:09:38,020 But, again, it's almost as if, sometimes, I

215 00:09:38,020 --> 00:09:40,690 think I wish I wasn't born Jewish,

216 00:09:40,690 --> 00:09:44,993 even though I'm not hiding the fact that I'm Jewish.

217 00:09:44,993 --> 00:09:46,660 But, if I wasn't Jewish, I wouldn't have

218 00:09:46,660 --> 00:09:48,850 had to go through all this.

219 00:09:48,850 --> 00:09:51,550 And I can't help it, and it kind of spills onto the religion.

220 00:09:51,550 --> 00:09:55,860

221 00:09:55,860 --> 00:09:58,560 And if you don't grow up with--

222 00:09:58,560 --> 00:10:01,710 I suppose-- of course, I got away from the church thing,

223 00:10:01,710 --> 00:10:06,000 but I'll go to a wedding in a church.

224 00:10:06,000 --> 00:10:09,430 And those symbols still mean more to me. 00:10:09,430 --> 00:10:12,790 Because, in your childhood, you had--

226

00:10:12,790 --> 00:10:15,550 I don't feel uncomfortable in a church.

227

00:10:15,550 --> 00:10:18,310 When we belonged to the Reform synagogue,

228

00:10:18,310 --> 00:10:19,960 my husband didn't want to because there

229

00:10:19,960 --> 00:10:21,130 was an organ there.

230

00:10:21,130 --> 00:10:22,800 He says that's like a church.

231

00:10:22,800 --> 00:10:25,083 I said that's what made me feel comfortable.

232

00:10:25,083 --> 00:10:28,950

233

00:10:28,950 --> 00:10:33,800 And so religion is another--

234

00:10:33,800 --> 00:10:38,930 it's almost like it's a casualty of all of that.

235

00:10:38,930 --> 00:10:43,295 And like I almost resent the whole religion because--

236

00:10:43,295 --> 00:10:46,475

237

00:10:46,475 --> 00:10:50,370 I mean, when I think about it, you can't blame the religion.

238

00:10:50,370 --> 00:10:55,025 But it's like, why couldn't I be one of the others?

239

00:10:55,025 --> 00:10:58,490

240

00:10:58,490 --> 00:11:01,090 And that's basically what I live with every day.

241

00:11:01,090 --> 00:11:04,390 I'm not saying I think about it 24 hours a day,

242

00:11:04,390 --> 00:11:07,390 but, when I do think about it, that's what I think.

243

00:11:07,390 --> 00:11:12,330

244

00:11:12,330 --> 00:11:16,424 Well, you've told us quite a bit.

245

00:11:16,424 --> 00:11:17,340 Thank you.

246

00:11:17,340 --> 00:11:17,840 I hope so.

247

00:11:17,840 --> 00:11:19,160 Yes, you have.

248

00:11:19,160 --> 00:11:21,840 And it's very important.

249

00:11:21,840 --> 00:11:23,400 So thank you very much--

250

00:11:23,400 --> 00:11:23,900 Thank you.
