8 00:00:21,510 --> 00:00:24,300 And then I had to take courses in psychology and education

9 00:00:24,300 --> 00:00:25,830 in Queens College.

10 00:00:25,830 --> 00:00:30,090 At one point, I came, I took an art course, history of art.

11 00:00:30,090 --> 00:00:32,520 And I walk in, I see my son there. 00:00:32,520 --> 00:00:34,350 And I said, no, you and I are not

13 00:00:34,350 --> 00:00:38,880 going to be in the same class.

14 00:00:38,880 --> 00:00:39,660 That was later.

15 00:00:39,660 --> 00:00:41,520 That was when I worked on my master's.

16 00:00:41,520 --> 00:00:43,230 No, not at this point.

17 00:00:43,230 --> 00:00:45,570 At this point, I did my degree.

18 00:00:45,570 --> 00:00:50,940 And I started teaching at Yeshiva Forest Hills at Dov

19 00:00:50,940 --> 00:00:52,920 Revel in Forest Hills, Queens.

20 00:00:52,920 --> 00:00:55,680 We had moved to there to a house in Forest Hills.

21 00:00:55,680 --> 00:00:59,010 And life was getting a little bit better.

22 00:00:59,010 --> 00:01:03,280 My children attended the Yeshiva of Forrest Hills.

23 00:01:03,280 --> 00:01:05,459 And I loved being a teacher. 00:01:05,459 --> 00:01:09,690 I succeeded so well that a few years later I

25 00:01:09,690 --> 00:01:14,280 was voted as the recipient of

the Teacher of the Year award 26 00:01:14,280 --> 00:01:16,500

by Yeshiva University.

27 00:01:16,500 --> 00:01:20,730 And I was teaching at Yeshiva University until '74.

28 00:01:20,730 --> 00:01:26,980 In '74, my principal took a position in Flatbush

29 00:01:26,980 --> 00:01:28,290 at the Yeshiva of Flatbush.

30 00:01:28,290 --> 00:01:29,700 And he asked me to join him.

31 00:01:29,700 --> 00:01:31,740 And I went to Flatbush.

32 00:01:31,740 --> 00:01:36,220 And of course, in Flatbush, I taught until 1990,

33 00:01:36,220 --> 00:01:38,190 when I came here to Maryland.

34 00:01:38,190 --> 00:01:44,880 But in meantime, in '85, I was already an adult,

35 00:01:44,880 --> 00:01:49,110 I decided I wanted to make a master's. 36 00:01:49,110 --> 00:01:50,700 And I went to Queens College.

37 00:01:50,700 --> 00:01:52,980 And I picked my master's.

38 00:01:52,980 --> 00:01:55,620 I decided to do a double master--

39 00:01:55,620 --> 00:01:58,470 one in the counselor of education

40 00:01:58,470 --> 00:02:02,980 and the other one in the marriage and family counselor,

41 00:02:02,980 --> 00:02:06,930 which I graduated, then I practiced

42 00:02:06,930 --> 00:02:08,270 marriage a family counseling.

43 00:02:08,270 --> 00:02:10,380 But my sons always tease me.

44 00:02:10,380 --> 00:02:12,720 They say, mom, you're the only person

45 00:02:12,720 --> 00:02:15,120 we know that went from the fourth grade

46 00:02:15,120 --> 00:02:18,300 straight to college.

47 00:02:18,300 --> 00:02:21,450 And I lived in New York until 1990. 48 00:02:21,450 --> 00:02:24,360 And I have two sons.

49 00:02:24,360 --> 00:02:27,240 My oldest son is an electrical engineer.

50 00:02:27,240 --> 00:02:30,650 And he moved to Silver Spring 15 years ago.

51 00:02:30,650 --> 00:02:33,810 And at this point, he designs telecommunications systems

52 00:02:33,810 --> 00:02:36,360 for Howard Hughes' company.

53 00:02:36,360 --> 00:02:39,870 And my youngest son studied medicine

54 00:02:39,870 --> 00:02:41,370 at Columbia University.

55 00:02:41,370 --> 00:02:43,680 And when he became a surgeon, he decided

56 00:02:43,680 --> 00:02:46,260 he wanted to move to this area.

57 00:02:46,260 --> 00:02:49,190 And he is now Dr. Leo Rozmaryn.

58 00:02:49,190 --> 00:02:51,220 He's quite known in the neighborhood.

59 00:02:51,220 --> 00:02:57,330 He is a microvascular hand surgeon and extremities.

60 00:02:57,330 --> 00:03:01,500 So 1990 I decided to move here and be near my children

61 00:03:01,500 --> 00:03:03,180 and my grandchildren.

62 00:03:03,180 --> 00:03:05,950 And immediately, I was offered the position

63 00:03:05,950 --> 00:03:08,070 at the Charles E. Smith Jewish Day School

64 00:03:08,070 --> 00:03:11,280 to continue teaching, which I have accepted.

65 00:03:11,280 --> 00:03:14,160 So at this point, I am very happy.

66 00:03:14,160 --> 00:03:15,870 I'm very content.

67 00:03:15,870 --> 00:03:19,680 And I feel that life has been good to me

68 00:03:19,680 --> 00:03:23,550 in spite of all the obstacles.

69 00:03:23,550 --> 00:03:30,180 When your mother came here, or when you got settled here,

70 00:03:30,180 --> 00:03:33,120 did you continue to talk about your wartime experiences 71

00:03:33,120 --> 00:03:37,200 with her or long distance with your sister?

72

00:03:37,200 --> 00:03:39,390 We always continued talking.

73

00:03:39,390 --> 00:03:42,810 And everything what we did and where we went, our food

74

00:03:42,810 --> 00:03:46,800 or whatever, we were always reminiscing about home.

75

00:03:46,800 --> 00:03:51,840 But most of that my husband and I

76

00:03:51,840 --> 00:03:54,060 used to talk with our children.

77

00:03:54,060 --> 00:03:57,660 Our children know all our experiences

78

00:03:57,660 --> 00:04:04,050 to the last detail to a point when my son went cross country

79

00:04:04,050 --> 00:04:06,600 and then to Vancouver, he went to a kosher butcher

80

00:04:06,600 --> 00:04:11,218 to buy some meat to barbecue, he detected in an accent.

81

00:04:11,218 --> 00:04:13,260 And then he asked the butcher where you are from.

00:04:13,260 --> 00:04:14,760 And my son was 18.

83

00:04:14,760 --> 00:04:17,070 And he said, well, I'm from Poland, a little town

84

00:04:17,070 --> 00:04:17,820 you wouldn't know.

85

00:04:17,820 --> 00:04:19,890 He said tell me.

86

00:04:19,890 --> 00:04:20,579 Tell me.

87

00:04:20,579 --> 00:04:22,590 And the butcher finally told him that he comes

88

00:04:22,590 --> 00:04:24,780 from a town called Sosnowiec.

89

00:04:24,780 --> 00:04:27,470 And then my son says to him, oh, you're from Sosnowiec.

90

00:04:27,470 --> 00:04:29,620 Do you know the Pilsudskiego Street?

91

00:04:29,620 --> 00:04:31,270 Do you remember the yellow roof color?

92

00:04:31,270 --> 00:04:32,760 Do you remember the bakeries?

93

00:04:32,760 --> 00:04:35,070 And that guy was absolutely astonished. 00:04:35,070 --> 00:04:38,160 It so happened that this was my husband's hometown.

95 00:04:38,160 --> 00:04:40,830 And my kids know everything.

96 00:04:40,830 --> 00:04:45,430 And they are so very much absorbed

97 00:04:45,430 --> 00:04:48,070 with the Holocaust in general and what

98 00:04:48,070 --> 00:04:51,670 happened to us, in particular, to a point when the Holocaust

99 00:04:51,670 --> 00:04:56,080 Museum opened up, I told my sons you have to go.

100 00:04:56,080 --> 00:04:57,550 I couldn't go for a year.

101 00:04:57,550 --> 00:04:59,620 You have to go see the Holocaust Museum.

102 00:04:59,620 --> 00:05:03,770 My son came back, and he said, mom, well, he said,

103 00:05:03,770 --> 00:05:08,560 I wasn't so very much impressed because what you told me

104 00:05:08,560 --> 00:05:11,855 and what daddy told us is much more that we see.

105 00:05:11,855 --> 00:05:13,230 Of course, it's a wonderful thing

106 00:05:13,230 --> 00:05:15,280 to have for people who don't know.

107 00:05:15,280 --> 00:05:18,743 But he says for us, you know, we are saturated with it.

108 00:05:18,743 --> 00:05:20,910 It's a matter of fact, when he went for an interview

109 00:05:20,910 --> 00:05:23,310 at Columbia, the interviewer said to him,

110 00:05:23,310 --> 00:05:26,500 you know, you act like a Holocaust survivor.

111 00:05:26,500 --> 00:05:29,196 What is your background?

112 00:05:29,196 --> 00:05:31,590 So thank God they're all settled.

113 00:05:31,590 --> 00:05:34,710 And I have wonderful grandchildren.

114 00:05:34,710 --> 00:05:41,220 And life is good at this point, all we should do is be healthy.

115 00:05:41,220 --> 00:05:45,630 Are there any sights today or sounds or smells

116 00:05:45,630 --> 00:05:49,350 that trigger your thoughts about the war?

117

Trooter tire was

Three years ago, I went

with a friend to Poland.

I was a little girl in

Vilnius [INAUDIBLE]..

I heard about Warsaw,

Krakow, Budapest, you know?

124

00:06:05,000 --> 00:06:10,190

But never did I anticipate

that I would go.

125

00:06:10,190 --> 00:06:12,020

I took a trip with

a friend of mine

126

00:06:12,020 --> 00:06:16,840

with a tour to Warsaw,

Krakow, Budapest, and Vienna.

127

00:06:16,840 --> 00:06:20,530

And of course, when

we went to Krakow,

128

00:06:20,530 --> 00:06:21,530 it was very interesting.

129

00:06:21,530 --> 00:06:24,490 I went to the Jewish theater there.

130

00:06:24,490 --> 00:06:27,782 And we met actors.

131

00:06:27,782 --> 00:06:28,615 They are not Jewish.

132

00:06:28,615 --> 00:06:30,160 And there's a Jewish community.

133

00:06:30,160 --> 00:06:32,240 And now they are waking up.

134

00:06:32,240 --> 00:06:35,170 We met people that didn't know they were Jewish,

135

00:06:35,170 --> 00:06:39,400 but the Gentiles that they were saved by,

136

00:06:39,400 --> 00:06:40,610 they started dying out.

137

00:06:40,610 --> 00:06:42,610 They were afraid they'll go to hell because they

138

00:06:42,610 --> 00:06:44,860 are very religious Catholics.

139

00:06:44,860 --> 00:06:46,630 So before they die, they told them

140

00:06:46,630 --> 00:06:48,130 that they were Jewish children.

141 00:06:48,130 --> 00:06:53,110 And now, all of a sudden in the Warsaw,

142 00:06:53,110 --> 00:06:55,930 in the Jewish organizations there,

143 00:06:55,930 --> 00:07:00,700 you have Polish Jews that are coming now.

144 00:07:00,700 --> 00:07:02,830 And they want to go into the fault.

145 00:07:02,830 --> 00:07:06,970 But when we went to Krakow, we went to Auschwitz.

146 00:07:06,970 --> 00:07:09,040 And I was never there, fortunately.

147 00:07:09,040 --> 00:07:11,560 We walked into Auschwitz.

148 00:07:11,560 --> 00:07:14,240 And I says to my friend, I said Malvin,

149 00:07:14,240 --> 00:07:17,020 do you smell anything here?

150 00:07:17,020 --> 00:07:19,270 She says no, vaguely.

151 00:07:19,270 --> 00:07:22,620 I said how many years is it after the war? 152 00:07:22,620 --> 00:07:28,590 That place smelled with burnt flesh, still does.

153 00:07:28,590 --> 00:07:32,640 I am very careful at home not to burn anything because I

154 00:07:32,640 --> 00:07:35,750 know I would go berserk.

155 00:07:35,750 --> 00:07:42,260 Otherwise, fortunately, here no, it doesn't, except nightmares.

156 00:07:42,260 --> 00:07:43,950 I wake up.

157 00:07:43,950 --> 00:07:47,820 And I'm being chased and all kinds

158 00:07:47,820 --> 00:07:50,520 of horrible, horrible nightmares.

159 00:07:50,520 --> 00:07:55,770 But I must say, I had help.

160 00:07:55,770 --> 00:08:00,330 But at this point, thank God, I got

161 00:08:00,330 --> 00:08:07,200 rid of my post-traumatic stress syndrome and off of the anxiety

162 00:08:07,200 --> 00:08:07,990 attacks.

163 00:08:07,990 --> 00:08:11,160 I know at this point how to control them.

164 00:08:11,160 --> 00:08:15,510 So actually, I feel at this point, I'm 68,

165 00:08:15,510 --> 00:08:23,440 I feel that if I would take a time in my life

166 00:08:23,440 --> 00:08:29,510 where my life was best, I would say this is it.

167 00:08:29,510 --> 00:08:34,679 When your boys were 11 years old,

168 00:08:34,679 --> 00:08:41,110 which was the age you were when the war began,

169 00:08:41,110 --> 00:08:42,190 was that hard for you?

170 00:08:42,190 --> 00:08:43,820 Did it bring back memories for you--

171 00:08:43,820 --> 00:08:44,320 No.

172 00:08:44,320 --> 00:08:45,820 --because they were your age?

173 00:08:45,820 --> 00:08:48,970 No, actually, it didn't.

174 00:08:48,970 --> 00:08:53,540 I felt that I did not, except for nightmares, 175

00:08:53,540 --> 00:08:58,200 no, I did not because the environment here,

176

00:08:58,200 --> 00:09:02,250 the social structure, the political structure,

177

00:09:02,250 --> 00:09:03,490 the democracy.

178

00:09:03,490 --> 00:09:06,340 In the United States, it's a system

179

00:09:06,340 --> 00:09:11,830 that does not remind me of anything that I experienced

180

00:09:11,830 --> 00:09:13,990 previously in Europe.

181

00:09:13,990 --> 00:09:16,330 I remember my relatives, like I said,

182

00:09:16,330 --> 00:09:18,430 every time there is any scare, I mention

183

00:09:18,430 --> 00:09:21,610 each and everyone's name because I don't want to forget them.

184

00:09:21,610 --> 00:09:27,400 But otherwise, I feel I was fortunate because, like I said,

185

00:09:27,400 --> 00:09:31,660 with all the symptoms that I had suffered,

186

00:09:31,660 --> 00:09:38,860 I felt that my life was not ruined by the concentration

187 00:09:38,860 --> 00:09:40,360 camp, by the war.

188 00:09:40,360 --> 00:09:43,870 My mother, people my mother's age,

189 00:09:43,870 --> 00:09:48,820 or people that came here my age and did not

190 00:09:48,820 --> 00:09:51,490 pursue an education.

191 00:09:51,490 --> 00:09:53,680 I know many people my age that they had

192 00:09:53,680 --> 00:09:55,810 married very wealthy husbands.

193 00:09:55,810 --> 00:09:58,390 And not anymore, but in the beginning,

194 00:09:58,390 --> 00:10:00,520 they started showing off their diamonds

195 00:10:00,520 --> 00:10:01,930 and their furs and this.

196 00:10:01,930 --> 00:10:05,230 And I said, I pity these women because they

197 00:10:05,230 --> 00:10:09,520 have to hold on to something, but it didn't do anything 198 00:10:09,520 --> 00:10:10,660 for themselves.

199

00:10:10,660 --> 00:10:16,100 So you see, these people are still in the Holocaust,

200

00:10:16,100 --> 00:10:21,200 like my mother and people younger than my mother

201

00:10:21,200 --> 00:10:23,440 that their life was broken that where,

202

00:10:23,440 --> 00:10:25,940 let's say, in high schools or universities.

203

00:10:25,940 --> 00:10:27,740 And they did not pursue.

204

00:10:27,740 --> 00:10:29,960 They did not rebuild their lives.

205

00:10:29,960 --> 00:10:33,380 They live every day with the Holocaust.

206

00:10:33,380 --> 00:10:38,570 I feel, to me the Holocaust it's the tragedy that I suffered,

207

00:10:38,570 --> 00:10:40,020 my family.

208

00:10:40,020 --> 00:10:41,400 My father was killed.

209

00:10:41,400 --> 00:10:42,590

My brother.

210

00:10:42,590 --> 00:10:46,280 And all the close relatives and all the Jewish people, that's

211

00:10:46,280 --> 00:10:49,850 why it was so difficult for me to go to the Holocaust Museum.

212

00:10:49,850 --> 00:10:53,210 And that's why I hesitated to become a volunteer.

213

00:10:53,210 --> 00:10:57,890 But at this point, I feel that I must because, essentially, I

214

00:10:57,890 --> 00:11:02,600 am one of the youngest survivors because all the other survivors

215

00:11:02,600 --> 00:11:05,690 that call themselves Holocaust survivors were either hidden,

216

00:11:05,690 --> 00:11:07,220 or they were children.

217

00:11:07,220 --> 00:11:09,440 Or they suffered in Russia.

218

00:11:09,440 --> 00:11:13,080 But to go through ghetto labor camps and concentration camps,

219

00:11:13,080 --> 00:11:15,380 I feel that there are not many left.

220

00:11:15,380 --> 00:11:18,890

And I feel it's my obligation to volunteer.

221 00:11:18,890 --> 00:11:22,550 And I feel that I could contribute to perpetuate

222

00:11:22,550 --> 00:11:27,920 the memory of the six million.

223

00:11:27,920 --> 00:11:34,730 So I personally myself, because I had rebuilt my life,

224

00:11:34,730 --> 00:11:39,560 I got my education, and it was so satisfying to me

225

00:11:39,560 --> 00:11:47,160 that I don't feel that I was totally

226

00:11:47,160 --> 00:11:53,860 demolished by the Holocaust, but I see many people who are.

227

00:11:53,860 --> 00:11:58,270 And I attribute it to the fact that I

228

00:11:58,270 --> 00:12:01,390 was so adamant about getting an education

229

00:12:01,390 --> 00:12:05,510 and fulfilling my life with being an educator.

230

00:12:05,510 --> 00:12:08,590 And I was very active in the organizations

231

00:12:08,590 --> 00:12:14,110 for Hapoel HaMizrachi, President and all kinds of functions.

232

00:12:14,110 --> 00:12:15,900 And I was giving lectures.

233

00:12:15,900 --> 00:12:19,900 And then, of course, whenever I was called to represent,

234

00:12:19,900 --> 00:12:22,690 to speak about my experiences, I always do.

235

00:12:22,690 --> 00:12:25,750 In my school, I do it every year.

236

00:12:25,750 --> 00:12:28,930 It's very difficult, but I, on Yom HaShoah,

237

00:12:28,930 --> 00:12:30,520 I feel I have to do it.

238

00:12:30,520 --> 00:12:34,510 In New York, I was invited to synagogues to speak and adult

239

00:12:34,510 --> 00:12:36,440 learning institutions.

240

00:12:36,440 --> 00:12:44,660 But personally, I think that I have picked up my pieces,

241

00:12:44,660 --> 00:12:47,330 and I have rehabilitated myself well.

242

00:12:47,330 --> 00:12:52,170

243

00:12:52,170 --> 00:12:54,390

Is there anything you wanted to add to your children

244

00:12:54,390 --> 00:12:56,130 or grandchildren before we end?

245

00:12:56,130 --> 00:13:00,600

246

00:13:00,600 --> 00:13:06,720 Well, my children, they are religious, modern religious.

247

00:13:06,720 --> 00:13:09,418 They live here in Camp Mill.

248

00:13:09,418 --> 00:13:12,140 My oldest son has to his credit, he

249

00:13:12,140 --> 00:13:14,900 started a synagogue, which is called the Camp Mills

250

00:13:14,900 --> 00:13:15,800 Synagogue.

251

00:13:15,800 --> 00:13:17,690 He did it single-handedly.

252

00:13:17,690 --> 00:13:21,260 And now, they have 250 families.

253

00:13:21,260 --> 00:13:23,270 And in the spring, they're going to start

254

00:13:23,270 --> 00:13:28,580 to build a real new temple, a real new shul.

255

00:13:28,580 --> 00:13:31,680

They are very, both my sons, hospitable.

256

00:13:31,680 --> 00:13:34,640 Their house is always open for company.

257

00:13:34,640 --> 00:13:37,460 If anybody moves into the neighborhood,

258

00:13:37,460 --> 00:13:41,030 they are how people know that they could call Dr. Leo

259

00:13:41,030 --> 00:13:43,820 Rozmaryn and Dr. Jack Rozmaryn.

260

00:13:43,820 --> 00:13:44,690 We have someone.

261

00:13:44,690 --> 00:13:45,770 We have a family.

262

00:13:45,770 --> 00:13:48,530 They are always welcome to eat and to sleep.

263

00:13:48,530 --> 00:13:50,510 Always there to cook meals.

264

00:13:50,510 --> 00:13:54,320 To take things to help out neighbors.

265

00:13:54,320 --> 00:13:57,350 They are oft, on a Friday night and a Saturday,

266

00:13:57,350 --> 00:14:01,340 they are always at least 15, 20 people in the house.

267

00:14:01,340 --> 00:14:03,710 So I am within walking distance.

268

00:14:03,710 --> 00:14:05,180 And I see all this.

269

00:14:05,180 --> 00:14:06,710 And I see my grandchildren.

270

00:14:06,710 --> 00:14:09,230 They study at the Hebrew Academy.

271

00:14:09,230 --> 00:14:10,700 And also modern religious.

272

00:14:10,700 --> 00:14:17,450 My older son went for a year with his graduating class

273

00:14:17,450 --> 00:14:18,050 in Israel.

274

00:14:18,050 --> 00:14:20,630 And he studies in a Yeshiva.

275

00:14:20,630 --> 00:14:24,410 And my children and my grandchildren, thank God,

276

00:14:24,410 --> 00:14:28,310 are going in the right path.

277

00:14:28,310 --> 00:14:32,730 But I want to mention one more thing.

278

00:14:32,730 --> 00:14:36,450 After the Holocaust, when people survived, 00:14:36,450 --> 00:14:39,510 most of the Holocaust survivors said

280

00:14:39,510 --> 00:14:44,070 if this could have happened to us, we don't want to be Jewish.

281

00:14:44,070 --> 00:14:46,470 Like Madeleine Albright's family,

282

00:14:46,470 --> 00:14:49,980 they have converted before to Catholicism.

283

00:14:49,980 --> 00:14:54,060 But after the war not everybody took such drastic steps.

284

00:14:54,060 --> 00:14:58,060 But people said, what for?

285

00:14:58,060 --> 00:15:00,200 I won't convert, but I don't have to.

286

00:15:00,200 --> 00:15:01,000 There is no God.

287

00:15:01,000 --> 00:15:02,740 I don't believe in God.

288

00:15:02,740 --> 00:15:03,925 I am not religious.

289

00:15:03,925 --> 00:15:05,300 And I don't want to be religious.

290

00:15:05,300 --> 00:15:08,920 I was religious at home with my brother and my father,

291 00:15:08,920 --> 00:15:11,470 with the shtreimel and with the kaputa and this.

292

00:15:11,470 --> 00:15:12,910 Now, what happened to them?

293

00:15:12,910 --> 00:15:15,670 I want nothing to do with religion.

294

00:15:15,670 --> 00:15:19,220 And these people, after the war, whether they

295

00:15:19,220 --> 00:15:21,160 had businesses or jobs, they started

296

00:15:21,160 --> 00:15:24,790 working on Shabbat and holidays and send the children

297

00:15:24,790 --> 00:15:26,110 in public school.

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00:15:26,110 --> 00:15:27,350 And they said this is good.

299

00:15:27,350 --> 00:15:28,370 This is what we want.

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00:15:28,370 --> 00:15:30,100 We don't need Yiddish guide.

301
