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JON: Mr. Lewis I was just going to ask you about what you heard when you were in Plaszon about the incident when Gerah shot Diana Writer, Writer wasn't that her name?

I THINK IT WAS REITER

VIKTOR:

I don't know.

JON: Yeah, perhaps you could - you could tellme about that.

VIKTOR: ER- I wasn't present, but I know that er a person like this was shot by Garch.

JON: What was life like in Plas in the time you were there.

VIKTOR: When I was there they was very hard from the beginning. There was no kitchen, and at this time I was one of the first one in in Plashow, I came up in December 1942 and I was working for the company the roads, and other things.

AND THE WAR ONLY BARRACKS

(NOT CLEAR) AND the roads, and other things.

This time there was only one barrack for men. There were no women at this time.

And er life was very hard, didn't have no food and we had rushing to work, I would say at least 18hours a day. That's all I can tell you at this time.

JON: How did you come to get on to Schindler's list because you were not part of the group who worked at the enamel factory.

VIKTOR: No, I was not (NOT CLEAR).

PART OF THE GROUP.

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JON:

Can you just start

that again after I finish speaking.

VIKTOR:

WHAT'S THE NAME OF THE group from er (NOT GEENR) ...

FACTORY?

JON: Let me just ask the question ... but you can just say from the enamel factory. So perhaps ... I'll ask the question again and if you could just tell me from the beginning, you know why - how you came to be on the list.

Well on the list to BRINNITZ. PUT BY MARCEL GOLDBERG (NAME) I was (NOT CLEAR) on the list to BRINNITZ.

(NAME). Why, I cannot answer, I just asked him to put me on it and er he put me on it, my name was put on.

JON: Why did you think it would be a good thing to be on that list?

thing to be on the list because er prior to this er shipment I was beaten up by 2 SS men. So I want to get away from them, as soon as possible from Plaszcw and I don't care where that - I go, and I went to Narce, and told him about it, he know about it, I was beaten up 2 or 3 days before, and er that's the way how he put me on the list.

JON:

Did you have to pay?

VIKTOR:

No, I did not.

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BRINNLTZ

JON:

Inside (WAME) you got

involved with the underground didn't you?

VIKTOR:

Right.

Could youtell me from JON: the beginning, and you can give me as much detail as you like, about how the underground operated inside the Schindler camp at **汚れがいてて** (NAME), and if you could say at the beginning something like inside the Schindler camp at (MAME) I was in the underground and then tell me about it.

Inside in Schindlers VIKTOR: camp in (NAME) I was in the underground, and how this started I will tell youhow. One night I was called, I was waked up and called to a kitchen of this particular camp, and coming up there you were seeing few people, few men whom I didn't know, There were people_from, like I said before, from the camp er (Net CLEAR). THE NAME?]

It doesn't matter JON: about the names, they're not so important, the names of people of the camps.

VIKTOR:

... camp er ...

JON: 130024N VICTOR: RIGHT.

Okay let's start it

again, and er if youwant to say just how you got involved and then tell me how the weapons came and so on.

VIKTOR:

Oh you want to know

how - how ...

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JON:

Yes, yes, absolutely.

Um ... How much is left on this?... So I'll ask this question again and as like before you can say inside the camp, Schindlers camp I became involved inthe underground, the people from Budzyn called me up in the middle of the night to come and talk and so on and then tell me about how the weapons came. Tellme about the underground at Schindlers camp.

VIKTOR: Inside the camp I was called, so joined the underground what I did. And how the weapons came was smuggled through er boy - Czechoslovakian boy, I would say aged of 9 between 9 and 11 years, what what what

they used tomake the ironwork, and UP-THERE (NOT CLEAR) he was the guy who picked it up from the little guy and give it to the

chairman of the underground.

WAS A MAN NAMED

JON: So you used to get weapons smuggled in from a nearby village by a Czech. boy and these weapons came

into the camp at (NAME).

VIKTOR: The weapons came into the camp from under - from the Czechish underground, where they were in forest nearby around 5 nights a week.

JON: Inside the camp what did the underground people do, what were you trying to do.

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VIKTOR: 7 Inside the underground
THERE WAS JOINED THE UNDER they were telling people (MOT CLEAR) - and

GROUND, AND

one didn't know the other one who was in it, I did not know who the next guy was until liberation. After liberation, then I knew who was a member of the underground.

JON: What was the intention of the underground inside Schindlers camp?

the Czechish people let us know - they

let us know that we're supposed to be

THE GRAVE WAS PREPARED SONEWHERE
shot and (NOT CLEAR) a mile, two miles away.

ON IT - WE SHOULD TOO
So they acted (NOT CLEAR) start fighting
and they would come to help us out.

JON: Did you ever have any connections with the underground which was supplied with weapons provided by Schindler?

DON'T

VIKTOR:

 $I_{\mathbf{A}}$ know nothing about

it.

JON: What happened when Schindler left and you were waiting to be liberated?

Schindler left from - from camp and I

was present and I so didn't shake hands

with him when he left. What happened

them we (Not thank) then we knew each

other (NOT GLEAR) because the chairman

of the underground called a meeting and

give everyone assignment to this particular

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let people out because there was

VIKTOR CONT: from Nazis, from er soldiers, army, and we had to keep people quiet because there was er around betwen 12 and 15 hundred people in the camp, we had to keep the camp closed so nobody was outside know that there is somebody living here in this camp.

JON: Was there any violence against the guards after the end of the war.

VIKTOR: There was violence against the guards, there was some shooting against the guards. I was not present at it but I know there was and I have to there was and I have to there was and I have to the cuards.

JON: Can I ask you that question again, and could youanswer it by telling me about the, how much have I got left ... fine. If you could just answer it by telling me about the hanging. Er was there any violence against the guards?

VIKTOR:

Which haning?

JON:

The er you remember

the hanging ...

VIKTOR: Right The hanging of KAPOHAN the (NAME) woman, against the guards.

JON: YES

VIKTOR: AGAINST THE GUARDS — Well I suppose the KAPO (NOT CLEAR) is better way yes, was there any violence at the end of the war?

VIKTOR:

Violence against whom?

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Um Mr. Lewis I'm going JON: to ask you in a better way that question. Um can you tell me the story of the hanging that took place immediately after the war, and perhaps if you could start it by saying immediately after the war, someone got hung, or however you want to say it. We're just going to wait for the airplane to go by, unfortunately the sound is very sensitive to thenoise of airplanes or police sirens and there ... Shall we cut? Um Mr. okay... no. .. Lewis perhaps you could tell me the story of the hanging and as I say if you could start by saying immediately after the war finished, Schindler left and then ...

VIKTOR:

Er immediately after

the war finished Schindler left and the factory was closed up,

before by the underground, between our people FROM THE UNDERGOE people that I who was a Russian ...I MEAN BETWEEN THE people

boy aged around 24 at brought this German him to climb the ladder

I won't say that it was by force but he hang I was there I saw it, and I would say that I was not further out than 5 feet away from it, and nobody stopped it and er everybody was clapping hands.

JON:- COVERLAPJ WHY -

Why did people want to hang this (

Because the group IN THE would came and they train, the frozen train, told us that he was murdering, on

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HIM. HE WAS GOING hang him up.

WAS A MAN NAMED

ILYA DOHNIKOV

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JON: Okay let me ask the question again, not because your answer wasn't very good, but because it would be nice to get the story in one bit without my questions. Om so I'm going to ask you again about the hanging if you can say that A (washe) was hung and he was hung because of the reason people who came in the train said. On was there any violence, anyone killed immediately after the war?

NIKTOR: ER there was one man hanged immediately after the war, he was KAPOHAN a (MAPE) who came with the train, with the frozen train, and he was hanged because people did - people who came with them said that he was killing people on the way er to our camp.

JON: Was there any other vengence against anyone else after Schindler left?

VIKTOR:

No, no I won't I won't

T DON'T - I didn't see any other work of vengence after
Schindler went. There was one shooting
in - in the yard, er this I - I remember,
there was some kind of a shooting in a
yard but I don't know what about.

JON: Can you tell me the story what you remember, when you went to open up the frozen train?

WIKTOR: Er, I remember that

we put some straw underneath the train,
and we lit it up and waited with the ice melted and opened the door of
the train we saw the bodies lying on the

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VIKTOR CONT:

floor, frozen.

SCHINDLER Strangely

- Schindler was present at this time at the train and we had, I was called and we had a little hospital in the camp, and we brought all those people into this hospital.

THE DOCTOR OF THE NO. HELSTEIN.

(NOT CLEAR And that's all I can tell you about it.

JON: Do you remember what you reaction was when you saw the bodies, when you saw the people and what Schindlers reaction was when he saw the bodies and saw the people?

VIKTOR: I remember that everybody was saying oh my God, oh my God, and Schindler also was - the same reaction ENDT CLEAR! WAS ON SCHINDLER, TOO.

JON:

Why what did it look

like?

VIKTOR:

It looked like dead

bodies, frozen hard with ice, That's how

they looked.

JON: Can I ask you again the question again, just so we can get it in a different way um if we have the story from the beginning about how you opened the truck and then what you saw inside and then what your reaction was and what Schindlers was, so tellme the story about ...

TALKING TOGETHER

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JON: Mr. Lewis I was asking you the story again about the frozen train and you were going to tell me the whole story.

VIKTOR: At er frozen train I was present by opening the frozen train, working on it, and er they - we put some straw underneath the train, lit it up, and waited till the wagons got er free of ice, when we opened it - the train, the door trains, we saw people lying on the floor frozen, some frozen to death, I - I - I - I don't know from the frozen. Doctors HILSTEIN give orders to us we should to bring the old bodies into the hospital. The reaction of our reactions to after opening the door was not to er ... couldn't YELLED even talk about, everybody oh my God. Schindler was present at this time too and he also WHAT'S HAPPEMING HERE?
And I would say would took at least 6 to around 6 hours (NOT CLEAR) move everybody out from this train, I also remember this was in the evening and going through the night, nightime, And that's all of course what I will have to say about it.
