26:00- Got mother out of Germany; she was in U.S.

26:30- Met husband in settlement; marriage; development of hospital in Dominican Republic.

30:30- Child born in 1945. Life was good.

32:30- Getting to U.S. and journey to Due West, South Carolina.

35:00- 1991 visit to Cologne. Antisemitism revisited, additional memories.
