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All right? Yeah. We were talking about Borak's parents.

I remember them. They was living in Bielsko-Biala. It's a village, and it's a bigger village in then Komarova. And it's more Jewish families in this village.

I know the parents was doing this in the village. I think what the same they was doing in the home. They got land. They was working, and all of them farmers, most of them.

They got more got two brothers, I think. One, his brother, I met with him in the partisans, his older brother, and two sons. I know now they may be in Israel. I think in Israel. Name is Freymann. I don't remember the first names. The last name is right, Freymann.

Do you remember, or do you know if Borak went to school in Bielsko?

In Bielsko-Biala Yes, he was-- he went to school.

To a Polish public school?

Polish public school.

Do you know when he started trading the livestock, when he began? Right after he got out of school, do you think?

After. After. I think that he begin to do this when he married, 30. No, it took him I don't know what, a couple of years, maybe, after the school.

When he and Borak went back to Bielsko-Biala, did they live with his parents?

Yes.

They stayed there?

Stayed in the same house. We got a house, and it was a big family.

That's all the questions I have. Do you remember anything else about them?

No.

No?

No.

And you said that they died in the Czartorysk.

Czartorysk ghetto.

--ghetto. And that was in Czartorysk.

Czartorysk.

Now how far was Czartorysk from Bielsko-Biala.

Bielsko-Biala. It was 12--

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Oh, that's right. You told me about that, 12 kilometers. That's right. OK.

[COUGHING]

Do you know when they were sent to the ghetto in Czartorysk.

I don't know the exactly time. No. The same it's happened like everywhere. The ghetto is the beginning of-- when they came just after a month, three weeks, one and a half, one. Depend what places.

OK. That's all.

That's all?

Yeah.

OK.

No more questions.
