SUMMARY

Ilse Awin, nee Mechlowitz, was born December 31, 1925 in Munich, Germany into a family who held Polish passports. She attended public school until 1935, when the Nuremberg Laws forced Jewish students to leave and go to Jewish schools. Her father lost his business and narrowly escaped a Nazi roundup after *Kristallnacht*. In August 1939, she emigrated to China with her parents.

Ilse shares her childhood memories of the journey to and arrival in Shanghai including the fear and anxiety of where they would live and how to survive. She details their living conditions in Kinshou Heime shelter in the Hongkew Ghetto district and briefly refers to Japanese occupation. She mentions assistance from the Joint Distribution Committee, Kadoorie family and other philanthropists. Ilse describes her curtailed schooling only attending school for one year at which point she left to apprentice in a hairdressing salon.

Ilse married Leo Awin, an Austrian refugee, in Shanghai in 1947 and they were evacuated in American planes in 1949, settling in Canada, where her husband worked as a craftsman.
