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You were talking about what message you would like to leave, the importance of the Jewish history. Anything else?

Oh, now, I think we always have to be on the watch out for any kind of discrimination for anyone. Doesn't matter where. Of course, any kind of Jewish discrimination hits home. But it doesn't matter what it is.

Yesterday, I was listening to NPR, and they were talking about situation in Germany. And this German politician, I guess-- I forget his name-- was asked, you know, about what's going on in Germany. And he's the one who said 350,000 people marched.

And he said, we don't make any-- we don't have any discrimination at all. And then he proceeded to say that-- somebody asked him about the Gypsies, about what was going on with Gypsies. And he said, oh, well, yeah, the Gypsies, well, they are different. And they do keep themselves different. And then he was going right on. And so they don't even realize that it's still there. Like, oh, but they deserve it.

Yes.

And that's exactly what they were saying about the Jews. So we have to be very much on the alert. It's so deep inside people.

Yeah, it's pervasive to all of us.

Yes.

Well, how has it been for you doing this interview where you made your life?

Good. I'm tired now, but I know some of the other times it gave me a real high. And I think every time, I come away with a little bit something that, you know, I learned myself, maybe, about the situation and about myself that I didn't realize before.

Well, I want to really thank you so much for doing this, coming so many times.

My pleasure, thank you.

And thinking about it.

Thank you.

Yes. I also want to ask you, and I forgot before. Did you ever return to France? To Gurs or any of those places?

No, no, no. I do have a picture here that actually is a postcard of Gurs. It's a watercolor that one of the people did of Gurs. And a friend of mine who was also in Gurs gave it to me. And they bought it at Yad Vashem. And I saw it there, when I was there in September.

Well, we are going to be taking pictures of all your documents and photos. But is there anything else that you can think of you would like to add here in the talking part?

No.

Well, thank you so much, again.

I think anybody who watches my story will think that it's enough already, shut up.

Oh, no. No. I mean, your memory is valuable.

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My husband walks out of the room. He doesn't want to hear it anymore.

And you told your husband all your experiences in the camps and everything?

Well, in 43 years, I think it all comes out at one time or another.

Yes, 43 years. Well, congratulations for that, too.

Yeah, I know. We both deserve an award.

Well, you are still together.

Yeah.

And thank you, again.
