38 00:03:55,120 --> 00:03:57,790 In your conversations with Steiner,

69 00:06:19,860 --> 00:06:23,430 So I let him have my coat. 70 00:06:23,430 --> 00:06:29,820 And so he just hung it over his shoulders, because it was,

71 00:06:29,820 --> 00:06:33,720 I think, too small for him.

73 00:06:36,633 --> 00:06:37,925 didn't want to be photographed.

207

312 00:23:01,990 --> 00:23:06,500 in his killing people with injections.

313 00:23:06,500 --> 00:23:11,398 So he aided him.

314 00:23:11,398 --> 00:23:13,190 And he said, well, what should I have done?

315 00:23:13,190 --> 00:23:14,840 These people are sentenced to death.

316 00:23:14,840 --> 00:23:17,780 The order came from Berlin.

317 00:23:17,780 --> 00:23:24,500 And should I have said I would like to see the sentence.

318 00:23:24,500 --> 00:23:26,840 I would like to have proof of it and all that.

319 00:23:26,840 --> 00:23:30,780 And it couldn't 't be done.

320 00:23:30,780 --> 00:23:34,670 And so he went along and did these things.

321 00:23:34,670 --> 00:23:38,870 And some people say that he did all these things with relish, 322

 $00:23:38,870 \longrightarrow 00:23:42,630$ that he was actually sadistic and enjoyed doing that.

323

 $00:23:42,630 \longrightarrow 00:23:45,950$ He was then in his early 20s and had

324

 $00:23:45,950 \longrightarrow 00:23:49,670$ fairly high non commissioned rank in the senate

325

00:23:49,670 --> 00:23:50,975 as a non-commissioned officer.

00:23:54,410 --> 00:23:56,620 You say he denied doing these things?

328

00:23:56,620 --> 00:24:00,560 No, he denied some of it and said, well, you know,

329

00:24:00,560 --> 00:24:02,270 there are certain things I had to do.

330

 $00:24:02,270 \longrightarrow 00:24:03,320$ I couldn't help it.

331

00:24:03,320 --> 00:24:05,060 But I didn't enjoy doing it.

332

333

and make it a bit

easier for them.

335 00:24:13,490 --> 00:24:17,990 beat them up officially in front of other inmates.

337 00:24:20,690 --> 00:24:21,530 be that painful.

338 00:24:21,530 --> 00:24:23,430 So these sort of things he told me.

339 00:24:23,430 --> 00:24:27,260 But I could write a book just on that person's story

340 00:24:27,260 --> 00:24:29,520 because I've got so much material.

341 00:24:29,520 --> 00:24:32,460 And as I said, probably hundreds of letters,

342 00:24:32,460 --> 00:24:36,395 which he wrote to me very, very consistently.

343 00:24:36,395 --> 00:24:43,850 He wrote to me just like periodically, just like him.

344 00:24:43,850 --> 00:24:47,000 So what is redeeming about the man then?

345 00:24:47,000 --> 00:24:49,040 Well, redeeming is--

346 00:24:49,040 --> 00:24:50,360 Too far.

347 00:24:50,360 --> 00:24:53,360 --not very much, actually.

348 00:24:53,360 --> 00:24:58,700 Redeeming is the thing that the man was a total wreck.

349 00:24:58,700 --> 00:25:01,580 And that he tried to come to terms,

350 00:25:01,580 --> 00:25:06,920 it was a very unsophisticated and, I

351 00:25:06,920 --> 00:25:13,910 would say, primitive person and who

352 00:25:13,910 --> 00:25:16,730 was not stupid but not very intelligent, totally

353 00:25:16,730 --> 00:25:19,220 uneducated.

354 00:25:19,220 --> 00:25:26,150 And so in his way, because I pushed and pressed him,

355 00:25:26,150 --> 00:25:32,030 he was trying to come to terms with what he had done. 00:25:32,030 --> 00:25:35,480 But he tried and, to some extent, succeeded.

357 00:25:35,480 --> 00:25:39,090 Some things he admitted and some things he said,

358 00:25:39,090 --> 00:25:41,180 well, I wrote about things.

359 00:25:41,180 --> 00:25:44,030 I had to do certain things.

360 00:25:44,030 --> 00:25:47,480 And I very frequently thought when

361 00:25:47,480 --> 00:25:51,140 these people were sent to Buchenwald and were punished

362 00:25:51,140 --> 00:25:55,970 and all that, this person could have been my father.

363 00:25:55,970 --> 00:25:59,000 And so that was quite an admission I got in that fine.

364 00:25:59,000 --> 00:26:00,230 And we discussed this thing.

365 00:26:00,230 --> 00:26:07,610 And unfortunately, I don't know what happened to my letters

366 00:26:07,610 --> 00:26:08,660 to him.

367 00:26:08,660 --> 00:26:11,300 And that would be interesting because I didn't-- after he 368 00:26:11,300 --> 00:26:13,490 died, I don't know what happened to his positions.

369 00:26:13,490 --> 00:26:14,300 The state took it.

370 00:26:14,300 --> 00:26:16,320 Whatever they did destroyed it.

371 00:26:16,320 --> 00:26:18,380 But of course, I have all his letters,

372 00:26:18,380 --> 00:26:22,010 and they all were going through the censure.

373 00:26:22,010 --> 00:26:26,810 You know, they all were read by the prison authorities

374 00:26:26,810 --> 00:26:30,170 or whatever before I got them.

375 00:26:30,170 --> 00:26:33,980 But some of them are really very moving,

376 00:26:33,980 --> 00:26:39,590 and also, some of the autobiographic accounts.

377 00:26:39,590 --> 00:26:43,010 And he has written about two or three for me.

378 00:26:43,010 --> 00:26:45,950 And I always pushed him to go further and deeper. 00:26:45,950 --> 00:26:54,200 And so that was very helpful for him psychologically

380 00:26:54,200 --> 00:26:56,180 to have someone who was sufficiently industry

381 00:26:56,180 --> 00:26:57,020 in pushing him.

382 00:26:57,020 --> 00:27:00,800 And he was not towards me.

383 00:27:00,800 --> 00:27:04,970 He somehow adored me.

384 00:27:04,970 --> 00:27:07,340 He thought I was the greatest, simply

385 00:27:07,340 --> 00:27:13,640 because I put up with him and showed concern.

386 00:27:13,640 --> 00:27:15,020 Did he know you were a survivor?

387 00:27:15,020 --> 00:27:17,000 Oh, yes, of course.

388 00:27:17,000 --> 00:27:20,070 Did he know you were Jewish?

389 00:27:20,070 --> 00:27:21,560 Well, yes.

390 00:27:21,560 --> 00:27:24,230 In this sort of way, he absolutely knew.

391 00:27:24,230 --> 00:27:26,990 But he also understood that people

392

00:27:26,990 --> 00:27:29,678 who were considered to be Jewish under the Nuremberg law

393

00:27:29,678 --> 00:27:30,845 were not necessarily Jewish.

394

00:27:30,845 --> 00:27:34,340

00:27:34,340 --> 00:27:35,930 But, yeah.

396

00:27:35,930 --> 00:27:38,160 Yes, absolutely so.

397

00:27:38,160 --> 00:27:40,340 So he admits to doing many of these acts,

398

00:27:40,340 --> 00:27:43,140 but he does deny his enjoyment of it?

399

00:27:43,140 --> 00:27:44,342 Oh, absolutely.

400

00:27:47,790 --> 00:27:53,250 Duress and all that, yeah, absolutely denied it.

very interesting autobiographic account.

407 00:28:13,980 --> 00:28:14,670 I taped.

408 00:28:14,670 --> 00:28:19,950 Unfortunately, I used a tape recorder

409 00:28:19,950 --> 00:28:21,680 which was on its way out.

410 00:28:21,680 --> 00:28:24,480

411 00:28:24,480 --> 00:28:27,120 The quality is not good, unfortunately.

412 00:28:27,120 --> 00:28:33,060 But it can be understood.

413 00:28:33,060 --> 00:28:34,950 OK, Gerhard Martin Sommer.

414 00:28:34,950 --> 00:28:39,710

415 00:28:39,710 --> 00:28:42,800 Since we're not allowed to say. 416 00:28:42,800 --> 00:28:49,760 So this is after I've departed from a visit to Wolff.

417 00:28:49,760 --> 00:28:54,230 And you can see in the mirror there, in the glass,

418 00:28:54,230 --> 00:29:03,350 mirrored is Wolff who actually took the photograph during one
