In this interview, Antons Pirožoks, local resident of Daugavpils, talks about the killing of the local Jews by Germans and their collaborators, which he witnessed in 1941.

[01:] 00:46:00 - [01:] 03:19:59

He gives his name (Antons/Anton Pirožoks), date and place of birth (June 15, 1928, Daugavpils, Latvia); talks about his family; father originally from Belorussia, educated in Leningrad, served in the military, worked in a hospital after that time; his mother did not work but kept a cow; his sisters went to Latvian gymnasia; describes family as well-to-do; mentions that at home they spoke Polish and Russian.

[01:] 03:20:00 - [01:] 04:29:59

He talks about his Jewish neighbors, **Mostya**, a store-keeper, and **Chaim**; describes them as very good people; relates how shopping at **Mostya**'s store was done: items were bought on credit, recorded in a special book and paid on the day his father received his salary; mentions that both **Mostya** and **Chaim** were killed during World War II on Zolotaya Gora (Golden Mountain) in the Forshtadt area of Daugavpils.

[01:] 04:30:00 - [01:] 13:09:59

He tells how Jews of Daugavpils were massacred after the start of war; the shootings were done by local collaborators of the Germans who were put on trial after the war; remembers seeing columns of Jews led in the direction of Zolotaya Gora; the group included men, women, and children who walked quietly; neither onlookers nor Jews expected the ensuing massacre; recalls watching from a distance how Jews were being killed, going to the killing sites shortly afterwards and finding a child's skull with curly hair; talks about how the ground over the buried Jews was still "moving;" tells that a second group of Jews was later shot at Pogulyanka area; mentions that Jews were made to undress before being shot; local people (including a neighbor named **Shpak**) took away and collected the Jews' clothes.

He describes Zolotaya Gora as a large open hilly area; mentions that in preparation for the shootings Germans employed men from the city to dig trenches to use for the subsequent burial of the Jews; relates how someone working there saw their neighbor **Chaim** beg for help.

[01:] 17:00:00 - [01:] 21:09:59

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He says that no one at home could believe that such a killing had happened; mentions German informers eavesdropping on people's conversations; relates how he was arrested and sent to work, first to a village and then to POW camp no. 207; describes the work at the camp; relates how he once tried to give a POW a pair of trousers and was beaten up by Germans.

[01:] 21:10:00 - [01:] 30:29:59

He talks about numerous refugees in Daugavpils, some of whom took apartments which were left by Jews; surmises that only those Jews who had run away survived; talks about Jews who returned after war; lists a few of his Jewish teachers and friends; cites absence of publications about events on Zolotaya Gora after the war; mentions extensive construction on Zolotaya Gora after the war, and the uprooting and relocation of the Jewish cemetery to another part of the city due to the new construction.

He talks more about going to Pogulyanka on the day the Jews were shot there.

[Filming from Pogulyanka area of Daugavpils where Jews were killed during the war, with commentary by Antons Pirožoks: At present, the place is marked with a memorial stone; there is a small forest nearby; public ceremonies in commemoration of the massacre of the local Jews in 1941 are occasionally held at the place.]
