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OK. Yes, sir.

You've had so many blessings in your life, and you've had so many hard things. I just wonder what you make of that?

Question is, with all the hard things in your life, and the blessings, what do you make of that? What do you conclude from that? Is that--

I don't know in what way. I feel lucky, and I feel happy that I went through it. And I want to share it with everyone who doesn't believe that it happened.

And want to emphasize how languages are important, because without knowing German or English those days, I don't think I will be sitting here today.

In fact, Agi, didn't your father, before he died, when you were young, make that point?

Yeah, he made the point that there might come very hard times, and everything will be taken away from us. It was so interesting that he saw this coming. And he told, only what you know will stay with you. So come on. Learn languages, and--

They can't take that from you.

And they can't take it from you.

I think we're going to wrap up in just a moment. When I listened to Agi both today and when I talked to her before, I just, I wish I could have met her mother, as I think probably everybody here feels the same way. She was remarkable.

And I also, I think it's important to note, that her mom in choosing to go back to Hungary, of course, went back into a country that was now under the Soviet domination, and spent a number of years there after being through all that she'd gone through prior to that. And so just you, and your mother, and your sister, just remarkable. And I wish I could meet your sister too.

Thank you.

I'd like to invite all of you to come back again to a First Person program. We have them every Wednesday until August 25. And next week, on April 28, at 1 o'clock, our first person will be Mrs. Ruth Greifer, who's from Germany. And she spent the war in hiding in the Netherlands.

It's our tradition at First Person that our "first person" has the last word. And with that, I'd like to turn to Agi for the last word.

OK. Thank you for coming and listening so quietly. And I just want to be sure that people who didn't believe that this happened will believe it. And that's why I think that the First Person is so important. And some small proofs. I can prove it only with the tattooed number, and to control it, it's right that I'm telling that it's true. And there are still many, many people out there who don't believe that it happened.

And I'm grateful to the museum to give me this opportunity, and I'm ready to do for the museum anything they want ever, anytime. And that's it. Thank you.
